APISTOL AT HER HEAD ALL BUT THREE DISTRICTS IN.

Bridget Burns's Story of a Bold Daylight Burglary. Consolidation Experts in Brooklyn Figure a Majority of 1,615.

Two Thieves Demanded Entrance at the Point of a Revolver. Then Ransacked the House, Taking Cash and Leaving Diamonds.

Two bold robbers, who entered the residence of Mrs. Kate Ryan, 23 Third place, Brooklyn, at the point of a pistol last night, are being sought after by the police to-day. The thieves, after ransacking the house, secured \$10 in cash, and left by the front door. The story of their visit is given by Bridget Burns, a domestic who was alone in the house at the time. The police doubt the woman's story, as the daring highwaymen left a sea-shell sash, diamond earrings and a diamond breastpin undisturbed. Mrs. Ryan is the wife of Michael Ryan, a salaried man on the road. She left home yesterday afternoon for a visit. About 6 o'clock, the girl told the police, she was summoned to the basement door by a ring of the bell. Opening the door and peering through the outside door, she saw two men. One gruffly demanded to see the 'lady of the house.' The girl told him her mistress was absent, and she was alone. 'I'm all alone,' said the girl. 'Then open this gate,' said the man, thrusting a revolver at her. 'I'll have you within a couple of inches of the girl's face. Open the gate, or I'll blow all there is in this gate through your body.' The servant, according to her story, who had just returned from an errand, obeyed the command. Still covered by the pistol, she decided she was better off to sit down. They rifled the upper floors, and after remaining in the room for about an hour they returned to the basement and renewed the search. They found \$10 in the dining-room. The girl says she was in the dining-room and saw the men stealing Mrs. Ryan's property. 'Now don't say a word,' said one of the men as they were about to depart. Mrs. Ryan returned home at 9 o'clock last night and was greatly alarmed when she heard the girl's story. The search of the house had revealed that nothing had been stolen except the money. She notified the police. Capt. Leavy and Sgt. Maude went to the house and questioned the girl. She declared her original story. She described one of the thieves as about six feet in height, with a high forehead and small mustache. The other man was shorter. Both wore dark clothing and soft hats. The servant is a widow, about forty years of age, and lives at 100 West 10th St. The police are looking into her antecedents.

CHURCHMEN IN COURT.

Swabwick Church Quarrel Comes Before Justice Getting. John Weaver and Christopher Cordes, respectively President and Treasurer of the Swabwick Church, were arraigned in the Lee Avenue Court, Williamsburg, to-day on a charge of stealing portions of the gallery and furniture. The trustees of the church have created a good deal of commotion for some time. The pastor and a majority of the members of the consistory have been at odds. Finally the members of the consistory appealed to the Long Island Classic and to the Rev. Lewis Francis, of the Kent Street Reformed Church, for the report of the Classic, which deposed Pastor Hageman, on the ground that his ministrations have proved injurious to the church, and further, that he is not in connection with any ecclesiastical body. During the reading of the report, Pastor Hageman excitedly declared that President Weaver had stolen portions of the gallery and furniture. Weaver's son loudly shouted that the pastor was a liar and that he would hear enough to chastise him. Other members of the congregation held him back, and a melee ensued. The pastor, on duty to preserve order, gathered around the pastor with drawn clubs. There was a scuffle, but no fighting, and after the meeting the police arrested the pastor at 128 Bedford avenue. After giving the pastor a hearing at the examination, Justice Getting discharged them, as it appeared that they had been authorized to take possession of the gallery by the Board of Trustees. The trustees have engaged Rev. D. Perry to officiate at the services. Hageman declared to an 'Evening World' reporter that he would not go on earth could keep him from the charge of the services. An extra force of police will be on duty to keep order at the services.

KING'S DAUGHTERS AND SONS.

Removal of the Brooklyn Section of the Order To-day. The King's Daughters and Sons of Brooklyn held a reunion to-day in St. Ann's P. E. Church, Clinton street, Brooklyn. The morning session was opened with a prayer by Rev. Rose F. Alsop, and addresses were made by Mrs. Emma F. Pettengill, President of the Brooklyn Union; Mrs. Bettome, President of the Order; Mrs. John H. Burdette, wife of Brooklyn's new Charities Commissioner; Miss De Comp and others. During the day officers were elected to serve during the coming year. It is proposed to increase the Board of Vice-Presidents from two to six. To-night the members will hold a soiree at the lecture-room of the church.

STRUCK HIS MOTHER.

Gibbot Was Incensed by Her Filial Cruelty to His Wife. John F. Gibbot, of 1023 Putnam avenue, was charged in the Gates Avenue Police Court this morning with assaulting his mother, Gibbot, who is a musician and artist, contracted a marriage that was distasteful to his mother. She has made several efforts to induce her son to leave his wife, who is of a different faith. This Gibbot refused to do, and the mother next tried to have him declared insane. On Thursday she went to her son's home and told him that she was going to leave him. Gibbot returned while she was thus employed, and in his haste to defend his wife, used his mother's pocket watch as a weapon. He apologized afterwards, but the watch was broken. This morning he was placed under bonds for trial.

TRIED TO BREAK JAIL.

Watte Caught While Prying Open His Cell Door. Charles Walle, of 11 Henry street, Brooklyn, was held by Justice Walsh, in the Adams Street Court, Brooklyn, this morning, to await the arrival of officers from Ogdensburg, N. Y., to take him to that city, where he is accused of assault in the first degree. Walle was arrested last night on Putnam street, and locked up in the Adams Street station. Towards midnight the warden, George J. O'Brien, and several other officers, while on duty, noticed a light coming from the cell, and a door with a piece of board which had been placed over the door, was found to be open. Walle was taken away from him and a policeman was detailed to watch him until he was arraigned in court.

WOOLEY IS MISSED. A HORSE SHOW FIGHT, FOR FREE GRIDRONS.

The Real Estate Man's Creditors Also Want \$15,000. John A. Logan Wallops a Groom at Baltimore's Exhibition. City Boys Want Football Fields Upon Which to Play.

They Don't Share His Friends' Confidence of His Return. Stableman Began the Row, Which Was a Regular 'Mill.' No Facilities for a Regular Game in Central Park.

Buffed by Mortgages on His New Rochelle Property. It Would Cost But a Trifle to Mark Lines and Erect Goal Posts. He Blamed Mary Rush, a Servant in the Same House.

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As soon as this was made known, the Board did not get together to canvass the vote, but remained around the Court-House waiting for the returns from the missing precincts to come in. At noon the Board convened, and the clerk announced that the returns from some twenty election districts were missing. A motion was made to adjourn, but Chairman Deede ignored it. When the canvass of the vote was about to begin Justice Potts read an order signed by Justice Lippincott, of the Supreme Court, restraining the Board from canvassing the vote of County officers until all the returns had been filed, and calling on the clerk of the Board to show cause Tuesday at Trenton why a writ of mandamus should not be granted.

The writ was issued on an affidavit signed by Frederick Frambach, Republican candidate for Registrar, and John Fischer, Republican candidate for County Clerk. Chairman Deede held that the order restrained them from canvassing the vote of county officers only, and ordered the canvass on the Congressional vote.

Congressional Candidate McEwan protested against the canvass proceeding, but was overruled by the Chief Clerk. Republican leaders on a plea to return them within an hour. Chairman Deede turned them, and as a result, the statement had to be made to the Board of Canvassers that returns were not made. Fischer is the Republican candidate for County Clerk.

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
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
