

ALEXANDER III. BURIED

His Body in the Cathedral of St. Peter and St. Paul.

The Young Czar Places the Imperial Mantle Over His Predecessor.

Impressive Ceremonies in St. Petersburg and Berlin.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 18.—The interment of the remains of the late Emperor Alexander III. took place to-day in the Cathedral of St. Peter and St. Paul.

The opening ceremony was announced by three cannon shots from the fortress.

The Emperor's body was placed in the coffin, which was borne by the members of the imperial family.

At the conclusion of the funeral service the members of the imperial family paid their last respects to the dead Emperor.

Eight generals then removed the pall and carried the coffin to the altar, while eight other generals bore the pall behind the casket.

It was headed by the Metropolitan of St. Petersburg and the clergy, intoning a solemn chant.

This was the most striking portion of the ceremony.

of the ceremony. As the coffin disappeared from view the loud booming of cannon and the salvoes fired by platoons of infantry from the adjoining fortresses reverberated through the church.

President Casimir-Perier and all the members of the diplomatic corps were present at the service in addition to a number of the most important military, naval and municipal officers.

STILL LAYING RAILS.

Despite the injunction of the Supreme Court and the prospect of being punished for contempt, Contractor John D. Crimmins had nearly one hundred men at work this morning laying tracks on the Thirty-fourth street for the Thirty-fourth Street Railway Company.

On the sidewalk, between Broadway and Fifth avenue, were huge piles of stone paving blocks, and in the street, were piles of broken stone.

The injunction was issued in 1882 restraining the company from laying its tracks in Thirty-fourth street, but despite that fact it began several weeks ago to put down rails.
