BAKERS HANG FIRE.

Their Stormy Meeting Yesterday Came to Naught.

Wholesalers Vainly Seek to Support Their Position.

More Letters Showing that Cheaper Bread is Feasible.

With the last plank knocked from under the Wholesale Bakers' Association's argument, that there is no money in three-cent bread, by the publication of the signed letters of one of its members offering to bake full-weight loaves for a fraction over two cents each, the Trust is casting about for an excuse to keep up prices a little longer.

The fac-simile of Baker Fred Egler's letter, printed in "The Evening World" yesterday, was a facer for the combine. A call for a meeting of the Association was sent out by Secretary Graves within an hour after the publication of the news that one of the members of the Trust had offered to cut prices. There was a great scurrying around among the bread barons to get down to the meeting-room over Fleischmann's bakery, Broadway and Twenty streets, before 3 o'clock, the time set for the meeting.

For over two hours they talked about the advisability of giving up the fight, and announcing that the reduction of one cent on eighteen-ounce loaves would be effected immediately.

The meeting was stormy and broke up with only one or two members of the Trust still in favor of the reduction to comply with the popular demand for cheaper bread.

Following their usual policy, not one of the bakers would talk about bread after the meeting. Each looked as if he had been through a trying ordeal and hurried away.
