

SLATTERY'S DERRICK.

It Was Ready for Use When There Was a Chance to Secure Funds.

MONEY MADE HIS MARE GO.

That Million-Dollar Park Fund Was a Bonanza for Politicians.

AND THEY WERE IN EVIDENCE.

Pay Roll Shows Many Peculiar Features to Be Explained.

Mr. John Slattery, contractor, &c., appears to have been especially favored by the Park Board in work under the million-dollar appropriation.

In one of the items of work known as the improvement of Manhattan Square walks and drainage, Mr. Slattery's name appears, under date of July 18, as follows:

The requisition for a horse, drum and a man to work the same, was signed by A. B. Tappan, Park Commissioner.

It is not more than 15 days, at a cost of not more than \$5 a day, that Slattery played to the limit and put in the full number of days at the top price, without rebate.

Laborers have been paid, under this appropriation, \$175 a day, while what are known as skilled laborers have commanded as high as from \$2 to \$2.50.

been paid at the rate of \$4.50 a day. Yet Mr. Slattery comes in and, for some reason as yet undiscovered, draws \$8 a day for his man, horse and derrick over a month later, on Sept. 28, he has another bill in. The bill has evidently been too great for him to resist, and in the same item of work he derrick bobs up serenely with a \$400 tag rate his derrick and all his live stock have been more than paid for out of this appropriation.

Mr. Tappan has made it a point to save time, time that the Park Board was acting under the greatest difficulties in trying to give men employment.

"We wanted," he said to an "Evening World" reporter not long ago, "to have waited to put as many deserving men at work as possible, and we did everything necessary to provide for them."

That was why, probably, he signed the numerous requisitions for Slattery's services. But it doesn't seem as if he or very many other members of the Board made an effort to give the unemployed a chance.

WHO IS THIS THIEF?

Police Investigating Missing Documents Involving Lexow Matters.

There has been an investigation going on at Police Headquarters for the last week which may reveal some things that the Lexow Committee may see fit to take up when its sessions are resumed.

Since the beginning of the trials of policemen for bribery and other serious crimes, there has been untold difficulty in finding important documents concerning the accused officers.

Naturally the suspicion arose that some one had been guilty of tampering with, perhaps stealing outright, documents from the vault where the records are kept.

What are called "appointment papers" contain records of all the examinations through which the officer has passed, together with other documents connected therewith.

On the result of the investigation, at all events, will be the straightening out of the Record Department.

Papers from 1885 to 1875 have thus far been examined, arranged in alphabetical order and systematized.

Some papers during those years were found where they belonged, and others have not been found at all.

Supt. Byrnes, who had been confined to his home, 17 West Fifty-eighth street, since a week ago last Friday from an attack of neuralgia, reported for duty at Police Headquarters at 9 o'clock to-day.

There was nothing in his appearance to suggest recent illness, except, perhaps, a slight paleness. He remained in his office but a few minutes, when he left the building.

The Superintendent returned to Headquarters at 10:45 o'clock and immediately summoned the police inspectors to his office. They were in consultation for a considerable time.

Assistant District-Attorney Francis L. Wellman and his wife (Emma) were spent about an hour this morning taking in the sights at Police Headquarters.

Mrs. Wellman was especially delighted with the museum and its gruesome collection of weapons and other things connected with the history of some of New York's most startling crimes.

Mr. Wellman was disappointed at not seeing Supt. Byrnes with whom he said he was anxious to have an interview.

Mr. Wellman said this morning that he will continue in charge of all police cases.

In reference to his recent resignation as an Assistant District-Attorney, Mr. Wellman said:

"It was done in a fit of anger at the unjust way in which I was attacked by 'The World'."

Francis L. Wellman denies that he resigned from the District-Attorney's office in order to be more eligible for appointment as the successor of Col. Follows, should that official be removed.

Of course Mr. Wellman would have to deny such a report even if it were true, but he declares that he would not accept the place if it were offered to him.
