Mysterious Death of an Old Man in a Hospital.

A well-dressed man, who said he was David Jones, contractor, died at 3 o'clock this morning in the Homeopathic Hospital, Brooklyn.

The doctors said he showed symptoms of strychnine poisoning. The identity of the man and other features are shrouded in mystery.

The man was about sixty years old. He entered the hospital shortly after 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon, and was given a room.

"I have just taken a Dayer's powder," said the old man, "and they never before affected me this way."

An ambulance was summoned. Surgeon Schall diagnosed the case as one of probable strychnine poisoning.
