Ex-Commodore Smith Intimates that There Is Yet Hope.

Dunraven Will Send a New Challenge for the Cup if Permitted.

N. Y. C. Committee Will Consider Terms Outlined by Cable.

LONDON, Dec. 19.—In an interview with Richard Grant, Secretary of the Royal Yacht Squadron, he says: "I conferred with Lord Dunraven this morning in regard to the challenge for the America's Cup. He decided to give New York Yacht Club another chance."

Mr. Grant, at the request of Lord Dunraven, came from Cowes to London yesterday evening. During the course of the evening Mr. Grant saw the Prince of Wales, who considered the America's Cup Committee's cablegram of Monday.

At 11 o'clock to-day Mr. Grant had half an hour's conference with Lord Dunraven at the latter's house, and action was agreed upon.

Two cablegrams arrived in this city this morning. Both had an important bearing on the America's Cup challenge. One was received by ex-Commodore James D. Smith, chairman of the Cup Committee of the New York Yacht Club, and the other by Dr. H. Mallard Kersey, Lord Dunraven's representative in this country.

Commodore Smith's cablegram went to the New York Yacht Club house, at 42 Madison avenue. The Superintendent, Keith Olsen, immediately notified Commodore Smith, who telephoned for the other members of the Cup Committee, after which he returned to his office at 42 Broad street.

A BEER-PUMP DISCUSSION SETTLED.

The Decision of Interest to All Multi-Liquor Dealers.

An interesting test and one important to every man who has occasion to draw beer from the keg took place yesterday afternoon in the brew-house of Christ. Hoppel, 223-225 East 94th st.

The test was made under the direction of A. G. Noack, General Manager for H. D. Berner in this city, and it was the result of a lengthy discussion as to the merits of the various beer pumps most in use.

It had been contended prior to the test that it would take at least five barrels of water to cool the heated beer carried to a height of ten feet. Yesterday H. D. Berner's "Champion" emptied a barrel of water which is exported more difficult to raise than beer, by the expenditure of one and one-half barrels of water in a space of time less than 30 minutes.

Mr. Noack was especially careful to make the test liberally as to the conditions. The liquid was kept at a temperature of 40 degrees before he began that he was willing to waive a matter of a few degrees in order to bring to which the liquid was to be raised.

The result of this entire fairness in dealing with the problem was that the committee who witnessed the experiments was completely satisfied with the justice of the award to those who have charge of the "Champion."

The striking proof of the excellence of this invention in its adoption in European countries, and especially in Germany, where more than 2,000 were placed last year, is the fact that the "Champion" existed there against the use of a pump for beer. It is expected that at least 100,000 pumps will be exported when the season opens again, and a large proportion of them already in use will last ten years, which is at present on the market.
