Richard V. B. Newton, once John Y. McKane's right-hand man, who was sentenced to the Kings County Penitentiary for nine months for ballot-box stuffing and other crimes against the Election laws in Gravesend, walked out of the prison at 8 o'clock this morning a free man.

As Newton passed through the gate to the carriage which was waiting to take him to Coney Island, he looked like a well-to-do business man or a lawyer, which he is.

He shook hands with the keepers and jumped into the carriage, where a friend had been waiting for him.

Newton might have left the penitentiary at 2 o'clock this morning, but he waited to bid Warden Patrick Hayes good-by and pay his fine of \$750, which was a part of his sentence. Five hundred dollars of the fine was imposed by Justice Brown in the Supreme Court for aiding McKane to hide the registry books, and the remainder was Justice Brown's sentence for contempt of court when McKane and Newton declared "injunctious not to go."

Newton arose at 5 o'clock this morning with the other inmates confined in the long-term prison and fled out to take his last breakfast in the penitentiary. After breakfast, by special permission of Warden Hayes, the ex-justice of the peace was allowed to see his two friends, James J. Sutherland and Scott Jamieson.

AN EXPLOSION IN BROOKLYN.

A Train Laid from Escaping Gas to Carboys of Naphtha.

Firemen Had a Narrow Escape, but Were Unhurt.

Firebugs made a fendish attempt to blow up a building at 340 Flushing avenue, Brooklyn, at an early hour this morning.

They ripped the gas-metre from its connections in the cellar, attached a hose to the service pipe and trailed it along the floor for several feet into a carboy of naphtha. There were two more carboys of naphtha a short distance away. Then, when they were ready to leave they set fire to the stream of escaping gas. Another fire was started in the hallway on the first floor.

While the firemen were at work extinguishing the flames one of the naphtha tanks exploded, but they fortunately escaped injury.

The building is a three-story brick structure, and is surrounded by tall buildings and is only two doors distant from a large wholesale grocery store.

Up to within a month it was used as a saloon and lodging-house. A few weeks ago it was rented by a couple of Italians, who paid one month's rent in advance.

A few days later they came there with a large stock of fruit and nuts and began business under the name of John Cross & Co.

The store was closed at 6 o'clock last evening. There was no sign of fire about the place until about 12 o'clock this morning. Policeman Walsh saw smoke issuing from the cellar grating. He found the premises locked, and called the firemen.

The building is owned by a Mr. Watson, who lives in Putnam avenue, near Grand avenue. The damage will not exceed \$100, and Cross & Co.'s stock suffered \$100 damage by water.

Mothers, OFFICIALS MUST PAY FINES.

Court of Appeals Decides Against Convancers of 1891.

ALBANY, Dec. 21.—The Court of Appeals has affirmed the decisions of the lower courts imposing a fine on Secretary of State Frank Rice, Comptroller Wemple, Attorney-General Taft and State Treasurer Danforth, members of the Board of Convancers of 1891, for refusing to obey the injunction of Judge Edwards, restraining them from circulating the Myler returns in the Dutchess County Senatorial contest.

War on Railroads in Order.

ALBANY, Dec. 21.—Assemblymen-elect in the city assert a bill will be introduced increasing the amount of mileage allowed to members. Bills providing for grade crossings in all cities and villages, reduction of fares on roads carrying more than two cents and forbidding discrimination in freight rates in case of preparation for war, and a bill to amend the act relating to the anti-pass section of the new Constitution will cause a regular war on railroads.

"DON'T PAY PAWNBROKERS."

Justice Hogan Recovers Stolen Spoons Without Remuneration.

Frank Collier, a salesman employed by the Gorham Manufacturing Company, of 385 Broadway, was held in \$300 bail at Jefferson Market Police Court to-day on a charge of petty larceny. The complainant was Benjamin Le Cato, a manager for the Gorham Company. He said the firm had missed \$20 worth of silver spoons, and the theft was traced to Collier, who had pawned them. Collier had been employed by the firm for a good many years.

Le Cato was a witness before the Lexow Committee, and testified that his firm had paid money to pawnbrokers to recover stolen property. He told Justice Hogan to-day that he had been severely criticized for his testimony admitting payments to pawnbrokers to recover stolen goods.

Justice Hogan intimated that the criticism was just, and advised Le Cato not to pay in future. He sent an officer with a note to recover the spoons, and told him not to pay the pawnbroker for them.
