ALIVE, SAID TO BE DEAD.

Strange Issue Raised in the Case of Theodore Lambert. CAMDEN, N. J., Dec. 22.—Judge Garrison, of the Supreme Court, to-day denied the writ of habeas corpus brought by Lawyer John L. Semple, on behalf of Theodore Lambert, who is under sentence to be hanged for the murder of Baker William Kalber, in Camden, on May 18.

Lawyer Semple argued that his client was legally dead. Lambert was originally sentenced to be hanged on Dec. 12. On Dec. 13, Semple obtained a writ that his case could go before the Board of Pardons. On Thursday a week ago the Board refused to commute the sentence, which had been fixed for Jan. 1.

Semple claims the Governor had no authority to interfere with the execution of Lambert on Dec. 13, because it was past the time when the Governor is allowed to set in any case. He claims the stay of execution was therefore a nullity, and that the law has no more authority to grant the writ to-day than it had when the writ of certiorari to the Supreme Court, if this was refused he said that he will go to the United States Court.

MARRIED, BUT WIFELESS.

Frank Isenbrandt Loses His Divorce and His Wife Goes. Justice Barrett to-day dismissed the suit of Frank Isenbrandt for absolute divorce from Emma Isenbrandt. Justice Barrett holds that the evidence of the marriage and the improper conduct of the defendant are insufficient to justify the decision leaving Isenbrandt in doubt as to whether he is married or not.
