Advice Given to Sufferers Whose Aliments May Be Safely Treated by Themselves at Home.

Kindly advise me how to use milk and water for weak eyes.—Henry B. H.

Take one teaspoonful of pure salt in one pint of warm water, and bathe the eyes with the solution as bedtime.

Please tell me of a good remedy for itching of the scalp and falling out of the hair—something that will make the hair grow.

Shampoo your scalp with tar soap twice a week and apply rum and quinine hair tonic once a day, and rub it thoroughly into the scalp.

Oblige me by suggesting something to improve the condition of my blood. My complexion is sallow and very pale.—W. D. C.

Try tincture of muriate of iron. Take ten drops in water (through a glass tube) after each meal.

Kindly tell me what to do for a pain in the stomach, which comes on after eating, usually at night, and lasts until bedtime. What is the cause of it?—O. J. C.

1. You should avoid haste in eating, masticate your food very thoroughly, and take a powder composed of two grains of pure pepsin and five grains of substrate of bismuth after each meal.

Kindly tell me what to do for excessive perspiration of my hands.—M. A. Z.

Bathe them with hot infusion of white oak bark several times a day.

Whenever I take cold it settles in my head and I cannot breathe through my nose. Will you kindly print a remedy that will relieve me.—M. C. N.

You may find a very good remedy in a mixture composed of ten grains of menthol, ten grains of eucalyptol and four ounces of benzoil. Use it with an atomizer every hour or two, as required.

Will you kindly answer the following question in your evening medical column: Is peroxide of hydrogen injurious to the head when used for bleaching the hair?—A. L. M.

Will you please give me an inexpensive remedy for pimples? My face is full of them. Also a remedy for constipation.—B. R.

1. Bathe your face with very hot water at bed time, dry thoroughly and apply a lotion of two drams of lac sulphur, one dram of spirit of camphor, one-half ounce of glycerine and four ounces of rose water. (2) Take one teaspoonful of pure sulphate of soda in a gobletful of hot water about one hour before breakfast and a gobletful of plain hot water at bed-time.


Will you kindly tell me what I can take for an occasional bilious attack?—S. R.

Take a five-grain blue pill or five grains of Gray powder at night and a good dose of villacava water before breakfast the next morning.

Kindly tell me what I can do to get rid of two warts between the toes; they are very painful.—J. P. W.
