RACE TRACK, SARATOGA, N. Y.,
Aug. 10.—"The Evening World's" expose in regard to the manner in which the laws were being violated by the book-makers at this track resulted in matters being quietly conducted in the ring this afternoon. The Association has taken no steps to have cash betting discontinued, probably because they fear that the books will refuse to give up the \$20 a day which the Association receives.

It was rumored that six Pinkerton detectives arrived in Saratoga late last night to get evidence for the Jockey Club. A close search of the ring failed to reveal their whereabouts, but it is probable that if there are any detectives on any such mission they would be strangers to the books.

This afternoon the attendance was large, the lawn party was an attraction and the card was first class. The lawn party, so called, consisted of a number of tents on the Club-house lawn, under which were spread tables bearing refreshments. There was a profuse display of hunting.

UNION BASEBALL PARK, BALTIMORE, Aug. 10.—Amos Rusie's arm was sore again today, so Amos sold before the game. The New York cranks have witnessed two games in which Amos and his aching wing officiated this week, and they were concluded so that Manager Doyle decided that the "Little Hoosier" should for the third time in his career place his variety of "sore arm" curves on exhibition again this afternoon.

This decision was early in the day, and Amos demurred. Manager Doyle finally consented to wait until the wing had been put through a warming-up process. At 10 o'clock the game was held in readiness to relieve Rusie.

It was the third time that the Giants and Orioles have come together since the Harlemites left home. Twice they tried conclusions yesterday and broke even. Both teams were more than anxious to get in a heat to-day, and in consequence an exciting game was looked for.

Of course, yesterday's efforts of Nick Young's hurlings lent a state-of-uncertainty to the proceedings to-day. "Capt. Hobble" was uncertain as to his selection of a twirler to put in against the New Yorks. Before the game he talked with Esper, Clarkson and Hoffer. Finally he decided that Hoffer could about do the trick.

DEMOCRATIC LOVE FEAST.
Thousands Gather at the Seaside to Arrange for Harmonious Action.
ROCKAWAY BEACH THE SPOT.
All Contending Factions of Brooklyn and Long Island Get Together.

SEEKING VICTORY IN THE FALL.
Shoulder to Shoulder Old Political Enemies Are Marching by the Sea.

SEASIDE STATION, ROCKAWAY BEACH, Aug. 10.—If a great National Convention was about to be held at this resort, instead of a gathering of Democrats from Long Island, who long at war with each other, are anxious to bury the hatchet and devise ways for a big Democratic victory next Fall, Harmony Day could not have opened with greater enthusiasm.

Last night it seemed as if everybody wanted to stay awake, as the sound of carpenter's hammers rang out incessantly. Platforms had to be put up to accommodate the big overflow meetings, bunting had to be displayed, hotels and other places had to get in order for the crush, and bands that have been practicing National airs for months had to put the finishing touches to strings and instruments.

Two big triumphal arches at each end of the street bear the words, "Welcome" and "Welcome to Democrat, Harmony and Victory." The Casino announced a special Democratic show for this evening. By noon the crowds were coming in. Five or six thousand people were on hand, cool and exhilarating breeze sprang up before noon, which made every one comfortable.

Some of the statements of the adjoining neighborhood, including Flushing, Jamaica and Hempstead and the nearby towns, rode to the beach on their bicycles. Many Long Island Democrats are cyclists, and the roads leading down from Far Rockaway were thronged with a procession of wheelmen all the morning.

Among them was Clerk "Jimmy" Carroll, of the Court of Oyer and Terminer, New York.

All the Brooklyn organizations came down in crowded trains in a body, and were met at the station and escorted to the headquarters at Seaside Hotel, headed by ex-Fire Commissioner John Ennis and a brass band. Following were the Jeffersonian Club, of the Tenth Ward, and the Young Men's Democratic Club, with ex-Quarantine Commissioner Geo. W. Anderson, William Carr, William R. McGuire and Judge Peterson.

Among other clubs which made a prominent showing were the Andrew Jackson Fallon Association, made up largely of Navy-Yard employees; the Twenty-third Ward Shepherds; the Robert E. Connelly Battery, of the Twenty-fourth Ward; the John McHugh's Democratic Club; the Twenty-sixth Ward; and clubs from Astoria, Hempstead, Long Island City, Parkville, Jamaica, Woodhaven, Ozone Park, Patchogue, Bayport and other remote points in Long Island.
