## "WE EMPLORE ATTENTION."

Foreigners in China Demand Energetic and Prompt Action. SAY DIPLOMACY IS USELESS.

England and America Must Send an Ultimatum Threatening Retaliation. CHINESE OFFICIALS GUILTY.

Foreign Residents in Tien-Tsin Blame Their Governments for Continued Apathy.

It was decided to communicate by cable the necessary immediate intervention in China upon behalf of the United States and British Governments, and the following telegram was, according to a resolution by the meeting, addressed to the Associated Press as an expression of the sentiments of the foreign residents of Tien-Tsin and as an appeal to the people of the United States for assistance:

"The foreign community of Tien-Tsin express sympathy with the friends of the Ku-Cheng victims. They consider the Chinese officials guilty, and the British and American Governments the continued apathy of their Governments for their situation.

"They regard England's demands for an inquiry into the Ku-Cheng massacre to be useless, for, as before, the officials will buy innocent heads and substitute them for the actual criminals.

"They protest that the Becheun Commission implicated the officials of that province, and, therefore, England and America must send an ultimatum threatening reprisals.

"Diplomacy is useless. We implore attention." (Signed) "DICKINSON, Chairman." WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—Acting Secretary Adee, of the State Department, was very busy today.
