EXCISE LAW FOR CLUBS.

Commissioner Roosevelt Gets an Expert Washington Opinion.

President Roosevelt made public a Washington letter this morning. For reasons best known to himself he declined to tell who was the author of the communication.

According to the Police Board, the contents of the letter have an important bearing on the matter of clubs and excise laws. Here is the letter:

"I sent you a late decision of the Supreme Court of Missouri on the subject of club and excise laws. It reviews most of the disputed questions. The question is now pending before the court in Albany, and Matthew Hale, who is of counsel in the proceedings, writes me that a decision may be expected in a month or two. As yet, there is no authoritative decision on the point in New York."

No general rule can be announced and we must look to each act of legislation for its own solution. Each statute is a law for itself. All that can be said is that the general course of decision in this country is that in the absence of express inclusion, bona fide clubs organized for social and literary purposes are not presumed to be embraced by excise laws. I am equally satisfied that drinking clubs, organized to evade the excise laws, cannot escape their operation by calling themselves clubs.
