CZAR WINS IN PERSIA.

Guarantees a Loan Secured by Customs Receipts.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 29.—It is semi-officially announced that the Government, at the request of the Government of Persia, and in view of the good relations between the two governments, has authorized the Loan Bank of Persia to take up the loan of 22,500,000 roubles, about to be issued in Persia, under the designation of the "Five Per Cent. Persian Gold Loan of 1900."

The Loan Bank, therefore, has contracted to take up the loan, which is repayable in seventy-five years, guaranteed by all the Persian customs receipts, except the revenues of the Custom-House of Persia and the Custom-Houses of the Persian Gulf.

In the event of a delay in the payments the Loan Bank will have the right to control the Custom-Houses. Persia undertakes to redeem all former foreign obligations of the new loan and not to contract any other foreign loan until the new loan is paid off without the consent of the Loan Bank.

Russia guarantees the bonds of the Persian loan.
LONDON, Jan. 29.—The terms of the Persian loan made public here to-day are regarded as a damaging blow to British prestige in the East.

FRANCE'S BIG PLANS.

NAVY BILL ASKS FOR 500,000,000 FRANCES FOR FLEET AND COAST DEFENSE.

PARIS, Jan. 29.—The Government Navy bill asks for 500,000,000 francs for the fleet, and provides six first-class battle-ships, five armored cruisers, twenty-nine torpedo-boat destroyers, 112 torpedo-boats and twenty-six submarine boats.

It also asks for 100,000,000 francs to defend the coasts, including 20,000,000 francs for the defense of Algeria the French naval stronghold on the coast of Tunis. Another bill provides for the establishment of independent cable communication between France and her colonies, bring the total expense up to 500,000,000 francs.

LONDON, Jan. 30, 7.02 P. M.—A despatch has been received from Lord Roberts, dated to-day, saying there is no change in the situation in South Africa.

The War Office was fiercely scored in the debate on the Queen's speech in Parliament to-day. The Government was urged to strengthen the nation's defenses in view of international relations.

Buller was defended in the Commons and the Liberal leader in the Lords said generals should not be criticised.

From Natal it is learned that all Buller's army did not retreat. Gen. Lytton holds his first position north of the Tugela.

Gen. Kelly-Kenny has occupied a strategic point, made a junction with French and Gatacre and has made ready for Lord Roberts's advance on the Free State.

MUST CONQUER BOERS.

"My Lords and Gentlemen: The peace which had recently been broken in South Africa when last I addressed you, has unhappily not been restored, but, otherwise, my relations with other states are friendly."

TROOPS IN FRANKFORT PREPARED FOR TROUBLE; RESIDENTS LEAVE CITY

FRANKFORT, Ky., Jan. 30.

—Late this afternoon Goebel's condition is worse, and grave fears are entertained that he will not survive.

He himself was calm and had recovered his speech. In a halting voice and with difficulty, he said to those present: "I must live! I will not die!"

As the afternoon progressed he sank rapidly and a rumor gained currency that he was dead. His condition is most precarious.

It is now certain that the shots were fired from a window in the Executive Building.

The Governor has ordered the entire State guard of three regiments to Frankfort. There is likely to be a fight.

Five thousand Goebel men will arrive from the counties to-night. Beckham, who ran for Lieutenant-Governor, is being guarded. He will be put in Goebel's place if the latter dies.

The Legislature may move to Covington and declare Goebel Governor if he lives.

NOW GOEBEL WAS SHOT.

Senator Fierced His Breast While Walking to the Senate—One Arrest Made.

FRANKFORT, Ky., Jan. 30.—William P. Goebel, the Democratic candidate for Governor, who was defeated by Taylor, was shot and seriously wounded at 11.10 o'clock this morning. He may die.

Mr. Goebel was walking on the sidewalk leading to the Senate chamber when a man in the second story of the building immediately to the east of the Capitol fired upon him.

Five shots were fired, and Goebel fell to the ground seriously wounded. He was at once carried to the Capitol Hotel.

NABBED ASSASSIN?
Goebel is not fatally hurt. The bullet struck him in the right side and passed through his body, coming out below the shoulder blade. At noon a report from Senator Goebel's

Goebel said when shot down "I guess they have got me for sure."

Some said that the wounded man was resting easily.

Harold Whitaker, of Butler County, was arrested on the charge of shooting Goebel, but is probably not the man.

CITY IN A FRENZY.
The wildest excitement was instantly created in the town, and within ten minutes after Mr. Goebel had been shot the streets were filled with men carrying rifles and revolvers.

A guard was instantly thrown around the building from which the shots were fired, in order to prevent the escape of the assassin.

A force of men dashed into the building and rushed up to the room from which the shots were fired, but could find no one.

LEGISLATURE IN PANIC.

The guard was reformed, and Adj. Gen. Collier, an ardent political opponent of Goebel, took charge of it, leading the work of finding the man who fired the shots.

The wildest excitement prevailed all over the town.

"They have assassinated Senator Goebel!" was shouted in the dome of the House of Representatives an instant after the shots rang out.

The members rushed pell mell over one another down the steps to the front of the building.

RIOT NEAR AT HAND.

In five minutes the news had spread and hundreds poured into the State House yard and it looked as if a riot would result.

Cooler heads advised the surrounding of the building from which the shots came, and in less than three minutes fifty special police surrounded it and a detail began a search of the interior for the assassin.

Ex-Mayor Ira Julian was early on the scene, advising the crowd to disperse.

"Let the blood be on the heads of the assassins. They have openly boasted for months that Senator Goebel would never be Governor of the State. They always intended to prevent it in this way."

ONE BULLET HIT.

At 11.30 o'clock Goebel was taken to his room at the Capitol Hotel and a dozen physicians made an examination of his wound.

The report is that but one of the bullets struck Goebel, taking effect in the right breast. Gen. McChard says there is a bare possibility of recovery.
