RAMAPO CO. LOSES.

Justice Alden Chester Hands Down a Decision Against Steal.

(Special to The Evening World.) ALBANY, Jan. 31.—Justice Alden Chester, of the Supreme Court, to-day rendered a decision in the suit to annul the charter of the Ramapo Water Company. The decision strikes out the demurrer entered by the Ramapo Company and holds that the Attorney-General had the right to permit the applicant to sue, and also that there is just cause for the application. The Ramapo Company is permitted to defend the action by paying costs and answering the complaint within ten days. David B. Hill made the motion to strike out the Ramapo Company's demurrer as frivolous.

A GHOST OF RAMAPO.

Senator McCarew's Bill to Repeat the Burr Law Has a Hearing.

(Special to The Evening World.) ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 31.—Ramapo's ghost appeared to-day at a hearing before the Senate Judiciary Committee. Senator McCarew's bill to repeal the Burr law of 1805, which protects the streams of Suffolk County, L. I., was up for a hearing. President Groot, of the borough of Brooklyn, appeared in favor of the bill. Lawyer T. M. Griffing and ex-Assemblyman Carl Burr both denounced the bill as the forerunner of another Ramapo scheme.

"YOU ARE A TRAITOR!"

Sewell Attacks Pettigrew in the Senate and Makes a Fiery Scene.

(Special to The Evening World.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—"I should say you are a traitor to your country, Mr. Pettigrew, and to you as much as to a Filipino is the death of Gen. Lawton due."

These words were hurled at Senator Pettigrew this afternoon by Senator Sewell, of New Jersey, one of the most conservative members of the Senate. Pettigrew had just taken his seat after making an impassioned speech in support of the Filipino insurrection, when Sewell, with his face flushed with excitement and anger, arose and addressed the chair. Stepping from his seat in the front aisle down into the pit in front of the President's chair, Sewell began his attack on Pettigrew's speech. Pointing his right forefinger straight at Pettigrew, and with a voice quivering with emotion, he uttered the words quoted above. For an instant a hush fell over the chamber. DASH TO LADYSMITH PLANNED BY BULLER.

British General to Try His Luck Again at the Boer Defenses, and White Says He Can Hold Out Until He Is Relieved.

Ladysmith Message Says the Garrison Have Food and Grass, and Are Not Despondent at Failure to Raise the Siege.

LADYSMITH, Sunday, Jan. 28 (Heliographed to Swartz Kop, North of the Tugela River).—The news of the prolongation of the siege resulting from Gen. Buller's failure is received with fortitude. We can hold on. The garrison is healthier, cheerier and confident. Disease is disappearing and there is no horse sickness. The rains give plenty of grass. We can hear Gen. Buller's guns still working, and it is rumored in camp that he is advancing along another line. The Boer laagers around are again full of men, who have returned from the Upper Tugela. The Boers have also taken up a new position on the hills near Colenso, where they are in great force. Reinforcements are apparently arriving from the Transvaal. Strong bodies of Boers are also visible between here and Potgieter's Drift.

GOV. TAYLOR ADDRESSES THE PEOPLE OF KENTUCKY; DEMOCRATS TO BE HEARD.

FRANKFORT, Jan. 31.—Gov. Taylor this afternoon gave out a statement to the people of Kentucky in which he vindicates his action in adjourning the Legislature on the ground of public necessity, due to the great agitation and excitement over the assassination of Senator Goebel. He declares the act, saying it is shocking to every civilized sense. At the same time he says it would be impossible to conduct the business of the Legislature with safety to the interests of right and justice under the circumstances.

The Democratic steering committees of the Senate and House are preparing a statement to be issued to-night. It is understood that this will cover the entire case of the gubernatorial election and contest, justifying the course of the Democrats and declaring their intention to observe all legal requirements. At 5 o'clock Senator Goebel was relapsing from a slight rally early in the afternoon. He is hanging between life and death with the chances still largely against him.

FELL WITH ELEVATOR AND WAS KILLED

James McKibbin, forty years old, of 259 Pearl street, Brooklyn, a workman, fell with an elevator five stories in the new building at Thirty-ninth street and Seventh avenue this afternoon and was instantly killed.

TROOPS HOLD THE PRISON.

FRANKFORT, Jan. 31.—Mr. Goebel began to sink slowly after noon and failed steadily but gradually.

He was fully conscious, and at 1 o'clock asked that a minister be sent for. Rev. T. F. Taliaferro, of the Methodist Church, and Prison Chaplain Wallace were hastily summoned and remained for some time at his bedside.

He then asked that a clergyman of the Christian Church, a personal friend of his, who lived some distance in the country, be sent for, and this was done.

All through the afternoon the stairs leading to the second-story of the hotel building in which Mr. Goebel's room is situated were crowded with people awaiting news of his death.

They walked through the halls on tiptoe and spoke in whispers when in any part of the hotel other than the office, which was packed all afternoon by a dense throng.

Mr. Goebel became unable to speak as the minutes flew. He lay motionless on the bed for a time and it was thought for a moment that he was dead.

Suddenly he moved and signed for a tablet to be brought, and thereon he wrote with difficulty his last message in this world, which the watchers silently read. This was:

"TELL MY FRIENDS TO KEEP COOL!"

KENTUCKY IN CHAOS

(Special to The Evening World.) FRANKFORT, Ky., Jan. 31.—Two State governments and two Legislatures are now assured in Kentucky.

In obedience to the orders of Gov. Taylor Republican legislators are leaving for London, where they will organize as a Legislature and declare Taylor legally Governor. The Democrats will also organize and declare Goebel Governor, and if he dies in the mean time will declare J. C. W. Beckham, contestant for the Lieutenant-Governorship, Governor. The Democrats of the State Senate met to evade the soldiers, and met and organized in Capitol Hotel, electing R. D. Utley, of Lyon County.
