GOSLIN OUT ON BAIL.

Brooklyn Rapid Transit Plotter Gives Bond in Philadelphia.

WILL FIGHT EXTRADITION.

Still a Belief Here That He May Yet Turn State's Evidence.

While it was said to-day that Alfred R. Goslin would turn State's evidence and expose the big conspirators against Brooklyn Rapid Transit, the fact that he was released on bail in Philadelphia and the declaration of his counsel, Robert Ammon, that he would fight every step of extradition would seem to discredit it.

The City Trust, Safe Deposit and Surety Company, of Philadelphia, furnished Goslin's bond. John Proctor Clarke said this afternoon that Gov. Roosevelt had instructed Attorney-General Davies to continue the prosecution of the cases. Mr. Clarke was so notified to-day and he will appear for the State when the offenders are brought to trial. It was expected that after the indictments had been made in the hands of District-Attorney Gardner, who was no little surprised when he heard of the Governor's action this afternoon.

The head of the E. R. Dean swindle has escaped the law before by turning State's evidence. The ground for believing that he at least contemplated doing so in the present instance is given color by these facts:

Goslin knew weeks ago he was to be indicted. In fact ex-District-Attorney O'Leary, who has been appointed special prosecutor, appeared before the special Grand Jury two weeks ago and requested that the indictment against Goslin be not presented in court until the trial of the trial of J. B. Kellough.

Capt. McCitrusky, of the District Bureau, went to Philadelphia to-day to attend the hearing in the Goslin case. A detective from the Central Office left this morning for Albany with the papers for Gov. Roosevelt to sign to secure the extradition of Goslin and Warner T. Allen, who was in Newark.

Allen was released on bail furnished by his partner, J. E. Ruskin, who gave a certified check for \$5,000. He said he would come to New York to-day and surrender himself.

Detectives are hot on the trail of the sixth man indicted, John Hogart, who for years was associated with Goslin in his schemes. Harry J. Alexander, an alleged associate of Alfred Goslin in the Brooklyn Rapid Transit conspiracy, was released on \$7,000 bail this afternoon by Justice Furman. Bail was furnished by August de Kanelin, of 10 West Fifty-eighth street, who is also surety in the case.

District-Attorney Gardner and the members of his staff are laughing at the results of the work of the special Grand Jury. Assistant District-Attorney Henry W. Unger, who has charge of the regular Grand Jury, called the special investigation a "stunt" and a "flagging excursion."

"Mr. Clarke is quoted," said Mr. Unger, "as saying that the key to the whole situation was the advertisement printed in several of the newspapers requesting replies to be sent to post-office box 1,688.

"I deem it due to District-Attorney Gardner and Chief of Detectives McCitrusky to state that the minute the charges were brought to the attention of this office, in December last, our first move was to work along those lines. Inside of forty-eight hours Detective Sergeant McNaught had the best part of the information upon which Col. Gardner intended to act, regardless of repeated broken promises and pledges on the part of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit management to give him other and better information which would involve 'game worth bagging' and not a lot of little rats whose operations were notorious.

They are to work in competition, with the second in view of establishing the first American style in hair. This fact, it is believed, will lead to ingenious as well as beautiful combinations. The fifteen have been hard at work for weeks designing styles.

The Association's exhibition is the first of the kind ever held in this country. Abroad, culture shows are common enough. Americans here are too busy to attend them. Besides, half the American women prefer to go to Paris for new styles in hairdressing. What is the cause of this? The latest fashions of French hairdressing? Not at all. CHANGES IN ALL STOCKS.

Market Was Quiet and Irregular at the Start.

At the opening of the stock market to-day inactivity and irregularity were the chief characteristics. Aposonds and Consolidated Gas made favorable progress at the beginning and each gained 1 point.

Third Avenue, American Sugar and People's Gas were erratic and very active. Sugar started the decline from 1 1/2 to 1 3/4, 3-4 per cent. above yesterday, but later dropped to below 95-4. Third Avenue likewise advanced from 102 to 103, then fell to 101-4, last night's closing being 101-4.

The Railway list continued firm and active. The features in this group were: Pennsylvania, Burlington St. Paul, Northern Pacific, Southern Railway, Union Pacific and St. Louis. San Francisco led off, all of which made substantial gains, the last mentioned jumping a full point from the last sale, to 102-4.

The short interest later was driven to cover in American Tobacco and the stock rallied a point above yesterday's close. Traders did up the steel stocks coincident with the rise in Tobacco. Republic Steel preferred gained 1 1/2-3 and closed a point of 2 points.

Chicago and Pittsburgh C. C. & St. Louis 1 point. Weakness then developed in the stock market. The decline from 102 to 101 in Burlington reaching a point, and many of the specialties reacted sharply downward, the last mentioned jumping 1/2 point upward in the afternoon on small demand. Sugar led the rise to a gain of 2 points.

An extreme advance of 2-1/2 in Metropolitan and of 3 in General Electric. The list then advanced in sympathy. Third Avenue was forced down 4 points, Pullman as much as Metropolitan and 1 1/2. Union Pacific Sugar was advanced and Third Avenue declining. The list was almost stagnant. The sale of stocks to-day were 1,000,000 and of bonds \$7,500,000.
