

PUPILS NEED MORE FRESH AIR.

Less Indoor Exercise in Schools and Better Health for All.

Less indoor exercise for school children and more fresh air and they will be healthier boys and girls.

According to Prof. Bigelow, expert physiologist at Teachers' College, close atmospheric conditions and cramped space are responsible for thin faces and stopped shoulders.

"I am not opposed to gymnasium work," said Prof. Bigelow to an Evening World reporter. "I consider it beneficial to the athlete, the person training for a race or something requiring sustained physical exertion. For school children a general building up of the body is needed. Children at the school age want oxygen, fresh air, and plenty of it."

It is the old story again, that our boys and girls ought to have strong muscles. As a matter of fact nothing of the sort is necessary. The boy with a large arm is not necessarily strong. He is not best able to throw off disease and fever. It is the general healthy, normal tone of the system which counts.

"The gymnasium, while excellent in many ways, is sometimes hurtful to boys. Again, while dumbbell exercises and calisthenics, as taught in schools, are harmless in themselves, the practice is often performed in crowded rooms, where the air is anything but pure. At the very time when the blood in its more rapid circulation needs more oxygen, it gets less. From this no good can result."

"A good, brisk walk would do more good than such exercise. Less violent motions could be taught indoors and the rest practiced outside."

"The problem how to carry on calisthenics in schools is a difficult one. Much could be done by impressing on the children the need of fresh air and the correct methods of breathing, standing and walking. After sitting at a desk all day school children become used to leaning over and adopting attitudes which, not gradually the habit becomes fixed and evil follows."

The cats won't come out. They refuse to be coaxed or driven. To all efforts they return a wall of anguish and ex-


TYPEWRITERS' NEW CLUB.
