

MRS. HUNT MAY GO WEST FOR DIVORCE

Mrs. Richard Howard Hunt, wife of the prominent architect, is going on a trip either to Wyoming or South Dakota.

She is only awaiting the arrival from Europe of her sister, Mrs. Oliver Jarriman, Jr. It is said, before starting with Mrs. Harriman and their mother, Mrs. Frances D. Carley.

In connection with the announcement today gossip recalled the domestic troubles of Mr. and Mrs. Hunt, and it was suggested that Mrs. Hunt was going West to establish a residence to begin divorce proceedings.

She has had frequent conferences recently, it is said, with her lawyer, George L. Rives, 30 Wall street.

Mrs. Hunt's friends say she is going West for her health. She has become run down, they say, by her domestic troubles.

The Hunts and Mr. and Mrs. Walter Wilson Watrous were close friends and neighbors at Garden City, L. I., and at Tuxedo Park.

At the close of the Spanish-American war Mrs. Hunt announced her intention to erect a hospital at Camp Wikoff without cost to the Government. She visited the camp in connection with the project and nursed soldiers.

When she returned she found a change in her husband's attitude toward her. "He told me he no longer loved me," said Mrs. Hunt later. "He declared he loved another woman, and that he would die if he could not marry her."

The couple separated after fourteen years of married life. Mr. Hunt offered his wife \$3,000 a year to support her and the children. This offer, it is said, was refused, and this was taken to mean that the matter would be taken to the courts. Mr. and Mrs. Watrous, it is said, also separated at this time. Mrs. Watrous going to live with her father, S. O. Livingston, of 25 East Sixty-fourth street.

Mrs. Haugler and Mrs. Kastener, the two women who are alleged by the police to have been with the dead woman before she died, have not been identified. It is said they have called for Germany.

Mrs. Haugler is expressed that the police allowed them to get away. When police Captain Frere, of the East Eighty-sixth street station, asked the Coroner to examine the body he said he had done so under surveillance. They left after that time. The husband of Mrs. Haugler came publicly to the funeral Tuesday and moved away the figure to a storage warehouse in East Sixty-eighth street without molestation.

SHOT DOWN BY ANGRY PREACHER


