

# ICE TRUST FIGHTS, SPRINGS SURPRISE.

### Monopoly's Lawyers Secure Order to Show Cause Why Proceedings, Both Civil and Criminal, Should Not Be Stopped.

The ice barons, menaced on all sides by court proceedings, to-day began to fight back. The lawyers for the big trust secured from Justice Andrews in the Supreme Court an order to show cause why the proceedings instituted by the Attorney-General should not be stopped, and while this was not a restraining order, the hearing set for to-day was adjourned until Thursday after a lively hour's sitting.

### THE REFEREE'S HEARING.

Myer Nussbaum, the referee appointed to take testimony in the examination ordered by the Attorney-General, called the hearing at 1 o'clock at 32 Liberty street. Special Attorney-General Coyne represented Attorney-General Davies, who was present in person, and three lawyers were on hand in behalf of the ice trust.

### TRUST SPRINGS SURPRISE.

Mr. Morse is expected here every moment, but before we go further I will tell you that we have just secured an order from Justice Andrews to show cause why Tuesday next why these proceedings should not be discontinued. I therefore ask for an adjournment until Wednesday.

### ATTORNEY-GENERAL ANGRY.

The Attorney-General was very angry and said plainly that Mr. Morse should be in attendance as ordered. Mr. Coyne then moved that Mr. Morse be called and his absence noted. Soon after this was done the ice king arrived with his personal counsel, Mr. Wilcox. After being informed of the proceedings Mr. Coyne asked:

### DESIRES FAILURE NOTED.

"I wish that fact noted," said Mr. Coyne sharply. It was promised that the books and papers, or those in the company's possession, would be produced at the next hearing. The proceedings were then adjourned until Thursday morning at 11 o'clock, but Mr. Morse was excused until Friday.

### TRUST PLANS A FRAUD.

Its scheme is to dissolve and loot the people by a secret agreement. A new move is contemplated by the ice trust. According to a story current in financial circles to-day Mayor Van Wyck, President Morse, of the American Ice Company, John F. Carroll and the other stockholders whose political affiliations and schemes to squeeze the public have brought them into court, fearful of the proceedings pending before Justice Gaynor, of the Supreme Court in Brooklyn, have devised a plan to avert further inquiry into the trust's affairs.

### TO DISSOLVE TRUST.

This plan is to dissolve the trust and close its books to public gaze effectually by going out of business. Court actions must stop them, it is argued by the magnates, who see relief from undesirable disclosures and relief from prosecution.

# SKIN-THE-COAT CAN'T GET IN.

### Decision Against the Irish Invincibles Is Confirmed.

James Fitzharris, known as "Skin-the-Coat" and Joseph Mullett, the two Irish ex-convicts who were excluded by the Board of Special Inquiry at the Barge Office last Sunday, and who were sent to the station east of the Immigration Service, Narragansett, at Ellis Island, were taken from the Narragansett this morning and arraigned before the Board of Special Inquiry at the Barge Office.

Ex-Judge George M. Curtis, the counsel for the men, was present. He was accompanied by "Rocky Mountain" O'Brien.

All the morning O'Donovan Rossa hovered about the Barge Office waiting for the latest information.

It is expected that an appeal will be perfected from the decision of the Board on Sunday to the Secretary of the Treasury.

### RUSSIAN CRUISER'S TRIAL.

Variag Strives to Be Tested for Two Days Between Montauk Point and Delaware Capes.

PHILADELPHIA, May 28.—The Russian cruiser Variag left Craneship Ship Yard to-day for her preliminary or "soldiers' trial."

The trial will be made between the Delaware Capes and Montauk Point, and will require two days. If the Variag meets her speed requirements she will be one of the fastest warships of her class afloat.

She must maintain twenty-three knots an hour for twelve consecutive hours under natural draft. The cruiser stopped at Fort Mifflin to take on ammunition. All her guns will be fired to test her structural strength.

### COTTON FIRM SPLITS UP.

Theodore Price Will Re-enter Cotton Exchange—His Partners Will Deal in Stocks.

There were reports to-day that the loan agreement of Price, McCormick & Co. has failed last Thursday, would be liquidated by a day or two. As these loans aggregate from \$100,000 to \$1,000,000, the report was regarded as rather premature.

Assignee William J. Carter had this to say about it: "The statement is not correct, but loans have been liquidated by customers to a large amount."

### Consolidated Company Buys in All Standard Stock.

The sale of the holdings of the Protective Committee of the Standard Gas Light Company to the Consolidated Gas Company was to-day confirmed by a Standard official.

The price paid by the Consolidated for the holdings was \$100 a share for the common stock and \$125 for the preferred.

The sale was effected through a broker, and the stock, which was held in trust by the Mercantile Trust Company, will probably be delivered to-morrow. A circular to the shareholders of the Standard Company, giving the details of the sale, will be issued this afternoon.

The acquisition of the Standard gives the Consolidated control of all the gas companies in the Greater New York, as the interests identified with it are in control of the Mutual and New Amsterdam Companies, as well as the Brooklyn Union Gas Company. There is a well-entrenched belief that no advance in the price of gas will be made before July 1.
