CROKER'S DOGS TO SAIL FOR HOME

Prize Pets Will Leave Southampton in the Charge of a Special Attendant on the St. Louis To-Morrow.

Tammany Chief Sensitive of Attention Given His Companions, So He Didn't Bring Them with Him.

 LONDON, June 22.—Rodney Stone and Bromley Cribb, two of Mr. Richard Croker's most famous companions, will sail for New York on the St. Louis, which leaves Southampton to-morrow. The distinguished pair, who are honored by a great share of the Tammany chief's attention, are prize bulldogs of long pedigree and many decorations. They will be in charge of a special attendant, who is trusted to deliver them, well and hearty, into the custody of their master. Mr. Croker is rather sensitive about the interest taken in these two costly acquisitions, and when he departed for home decided to leave them behind, to follow later, as he said, "to trick the reporters," according to the head man at his place, Wantage. The dogs will not occupy first-cabin staterooms, but will be the recipients of much care and attention during the voyage.

"TEDDY'S" LOVE FEAST WITH PLATT.

Roosevelt and the Senator Buried the Hatchet and All is Lovely.

Governor Refused to Discuss Mayor Van Wyck and the Ice Scandal.

Gov. Roosevelt, Senator Platt and Chairman Odell had a forty-five-minute conference at the Fifth Avenue Hotel this morning. At its conclusion Mr. Odell said: "The Governor's greeting to Mr. Platt was cordial and delightful, and it sets at rest all the rumors that bitter feelings exist between Mr. Platt and Mr. Roosevelt." With brightly step, chest thrown out and that characteristic curve of the neck which betokens physical buoyancy and mental clarity, Gov. Roosevelt came down the stairway of the Union League Club at 6:05 o'clock this morning. At the foot of the stairway he was surrounded by a group of newspaper men. BROOKLYN RAPID TRANSIT'S BIG DROP

Stock Leads the Traction in a Sudden Decline in the Market and Touches the Lowest Point in Two Years.

The feature of the stock market today was the sharp decline in Brooklyn Rapid Transit, the stock touching the lowest point it has reached in two years. Early in the afternoon it sold off to 12.12, after selling up to 13 earlier in the day. The stock seemed to be without support and other traction shares fell off in sympathy.

In April, 1898, B. R. T. shares sold up to 18. At the office of Flower & Co., who are prominent in the affairs of the traction company, no information as to the reasons for the decline was forthcoming beyond the statement that "the street is generally bearish and that the entire list is without support at this time." All other public appearances between now and July 12, the date on which the Notification Committee will visit him, have been cancelled. BIG FIRE IN PITTSBURG.

Almost a Square Block Destroyed—Several Lives Lost.

 PITTSBURG, June 22.—A big fire broke out here this afternoon in the heart of the business section and destroyed almost a square block. Several lives are supposed to have been lost. Among buildings destroyed were:

The five-story Eichbaum Building, 245 Fifth avenue; Duff's College Building, Pitt's restaurant, the Exchange National Bank and the Hussey Building. Several persons are reported to have been caught in the Duff building and burned to death. The loss is heavy. The entire Fire Department was called out.

GAS TRUST IS SUPREME

Standard Raises Price—Uniform Rate is Now \$1.05.

The Executive Committee of the Standard Gaslight Company held a meeting this noon and decided to advance the price of gas to the legal limit. The advance will commence next Monday, June 25. The rate that will be charged hereafter will be \$1.05 per 1,000 cubic feet. The gas rate is now uniform throughout New York County and removes the last sign of the gas war.

MERCURY WAS AT 91 DEGREES.

Weather Man Says We Only Think It's Warm.

THE WEATHER.
 Forecast for the thirty-six hours ending 5 P. M. Saturday for New York City and vicinity:
 Thunderstorms this evening, to-night and Saturday. Fresh to brisk variable winds with squalls.

If the street thermometers are to be relied upon, this was among the hottest days recorded since 1883. Along Park Row sizzling humanity found that thermometers registered 91 degrees, and few doubted the accuracy of the tube indicators. But the weather man insisted it was not so warm, simply because his official instrument, far up among the clouds, only indicated 83 degrees. That was at 1 o'clock, which was the hottest period of the day. During the morning the humidity was 89 degrees, but by 3 P. M. this had lapped off 24 points. "We think it's warm weather," commented the weather man with logical argument, "because we have been having a hot fine cool spell."

STOLE BEER STAMPS.

Riley Convicted of Having Property Belonging to Revenue Department.

Thomas Riley, charged with having and retaining stolen property of the United States in the form of internal revenue beer stamps, was found guilty this afternoon by a jury in the United States Circuit Court, Criminal Branch. Riley and Thomas Blaney, a Brooklyn bartender, were arrested about the middle of April last by United States Revenue officers. In the possession of the men were found beer stamps of the total value of \$200.

WASHINGTON, June 22.—President McKinley and the Cabinet met to-day and it was later announced the steps had been taken to send more troops from the Philippines to China.

A despatch was sent to Gen. MacArthur asking what troops could be spared and how soon. They may not be sent at once, but if the news of the next twenty-four hours continues as grave as to-day no time will be lost rushing soldiers to Taku.

Reports were received overnight at the Navy Department from China, but are withheld from publication. They are, it is believed, confirmatory of the reports from Europe of the need of reinforcements for the international forces at Tientsin.

Hurry orders have been sent to get the Ninth Regiment off from Manila.

One regiment at least will in any event be sent to Tientsin.

ALLIED TROOPS AT BAY; RELIEF FORCE IS SENT

LONDON, June 22.—In the House of Commons to-day Under Foreign Secretary Brodrick said that news by Rear-Admiral Bruce, at Taku, telegraphed last night the further information that at Tien-Tsin, June 20, fighting was proceeding and that reinforcements were required. Mr. Brodrick also said they further heard from Admiral Bruce, dated Taku last night and Chedao to-day, as follows: "I am hoping Tien-Tsin may be relieved to-night." "No news from the Commander-in-Chief." "The Terrible landed this morning 2 officers and men of the Fusiliers." Mr. Brodrick announced that he believed other troops would arrive in a day or two, if they had not already landed and that arrangements had been made to supplement very considerably the force already ordered to China. The Foreign Office has no news from Peking or Vice-Admiral Seymour.

BRITISH CABINET HAS A MEETING ON CHINA
