
ARTIST POWERS TAKES A TRIP TO CONEY ISLAND.

"On the way back we saw papa, mamma and the kids going home. They didn't know their own house. The nice new awnings were ribbons and the chimney was gone.


"I was hotter when I got back than when I started. 'But it was great fun.' ALPACA COATS FOR POLICEMEN.

SCHURMAN RAIDS TWO POOL-ROOMS.

Assistant District-Attorney Takes Up Justice Jerome's Cast-Off Job—Five Prisoners Taken.

Two pool-rooms were raided this afternoon at No. 15 Whitehall street and No. 18 South street by McCullagh men under the direction of Assistant District-Attorney Schurman, who had taken up Justice Jerome's job.

The raids were made by direction of District-Attorney Fabin, and Magistrate Deuel issued the warrants, all in the name of the Law family.

Two arrests were made at the Whitehall street room, which was on the top floor. The prisoners were taken to the Criminal Courts Building by Officers Kauff and Harrigan.

In the South street room three arrests were made after an exciting fight. These prisoners were also taken to court.

Magistrate Deuel was waiting to dispose of the cases. The prisoners all went out after bail. If it is not secured to-night they will be locked up over the Fourth.

In all eighteen of McCullagh's men were sent out on raids. Only seven returned from the two raids reported. The prisoners, John Brady, John Nolan, Thomas Burns, Frank Lynn and Joseph Burke, were bailed.

"Barney" Morris, Brooklyn's Oldest Inhabitant, Who Never Drank or Smoked, Dead.



"Barney" Morris, the oldest resident of Brooklyn, is dead, killed by the heat. He was one hundred and nine years old. The funeral will be from the home of his daughter, Sarah Cohen, No. 142 Fulton street, on Friday. Interment will be in Holy Cross Cemetery.

Mr. Morris was known to every frequenter of Prospect Park, where he worked as a cleaner more years than any other man in the city.
