

# McKINLEY WARMS CHINA OF PERIL.

## Refuses to Negotiate to Stop Allies' March Until Put in Touch with Conger - Advance to Peking Is Pushed.

LONDON, Aug. 2.—United States Ambassador Choate called at the Foreign Office here to-day. He did not see Lord Salisbury, but it is understood that he left a memorandum to the effect that the United States purpose to pay no heed to Li Hung Chang's remonstrances against an advance on Peking nor to assurances that communication with Minister Conger will be established some time in the future.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—As soon as President McKinley arrived here to-day from Canton a Cabinet council of war on China was called to meet at 11 A. M. The whole Chinese situation was gone over, and later Secretary Hay's reply to Li Hung Chang's request to stop the advance on Peking if Minister Conger and the other envoys were delivered at Tientsin safely was given out.

Secretary Hay takes a strong position and refuses the request, holding that this Government must be placed in communication with Minister Conger before anything at all can be done in the way of negotiations. It is held that his proposal proves that if needed this Government can be placed in touch with Conger and he is warned of his heavy responsibility.

Telegrams containing this correspondence were sent to United States Minis-

ters abroad so that foreign governments may be advised of our action. The correspondence is as follows:

### HAY TO EARL LI.

DEPARTMENT OF STATE, AUG. 1.  
In reply to a suggestion of Li Hung Chang that the Ministers might be sent under safe escort to Tientsin provided the powers would engage not to march on Peking, the Secretary of State replied on July 30:

"This Government will not enter into any arrangement regarding disposition or treatment of legations without first having free communication with Minister Conger. Responsibility for their protection rests upon Chinese Government. Power to deliver at Tientsin presupposes power to protect and to open communication. This is insisted on."

This message was delivered by Mr. Goodnow on the 31st to Viceroy Li, who then inquired whether "if free communication were established between Ministers and their governments it could be arranged that the powers should not advance on Peking pending negotiations."

To this inquiry the following reply was sent on Aug. 1 to Consul-General Goodnow at Shanghai:

"I do not think it expedient to submit the proposition of Earl Li to the other powers. Free communication with our representatives in Peking is demanded as a matter of absolute right, and not

as a favor. Since the Chinese Government admits that it possesses the power to give communication, it puts itself in an unfriendly attitude by denying it. No negotiations seem advisable until the Chinese Government shall have put the diplomatic representatives of the powers in full and free communication with their respective Governments and removed all danger to their lives and liberty.

"We would urge Earl Li earnestly to advise the imperial authorities of China to place themselves in friendly communication and cooperation with the relief expedition. They are assuming a heavy responsibility in acting otherwise."

"HAY."  
At the meeting the President was fully advised of all the military and diplomatic steps taken. Those were given his approval.

It is held that the duplicity of the Imperial Government is not established. The regular troops may have been unable to prevent attacks on the legations.

Nothing has occurred to change the policy of the government. A state of war is not regarded as existing. Nothing has been received concerning the advance toward Peking.

Officials are inclined to consider it only a preliminary movement to locate Chinese troops and estimate the resistance to be expected.

Officials believe that Alexieff, the Russian Admiral, has been made commander-in-chief of that the various foreign governments are acting concurrently on an agreed plan without such selection.

# SREN LED BRESCI, AT MATATESTA'S COMMANDS, TO AWFUL CRIME.

## Love of Fair Anarchist Impelled Philosophic Workman to Become an Assassin and Doom His Kin to Shame.



LA BELLA TERESA BRUGNOLI. New York Woman Anarchist Who Inspired Her Sweetheart, Gaetano Bresci, to Assassinate the King of Italy.

In the boarding-house of M. Bassi, at 84 Macdougal street, this city, was plotted the Anarchist assassination that has thrilled the world with horror.

There are a hundred or more boarders—all Anarchists.

That met Bresci, whose hand sent King Humbert to death; Antonio Sassi, arrested in Italy yesterday, and the mysterious and beautiful Teresa Brugnoli, also a prisoner in the hands of the Italian police.

The young woman was known in the neighborhood as "La Bella Teresa." Whence she came and who supplied her with money no one seemed to know. She was well educated and had evidently traveled extensively, for she had knowledge of many strange lands.

At Canton the authorities are enlisting recruits at \$4 a month, twice the usual pay. Proclamations sent to the recruiting stations threaten officers who defraud the troops.

A despatch from Tientsin reports that Lieut. Gen. Linewitch had succeeded Admiral Alexieff in command of the Russian forces. The Russians are constructing armored trains in the Tientsin shops and intend reconstructing the railway as fast as the column advances toward Peking.

The following cablegram from the Rev. E. W. Stevenson to-day:

"SHANGHAI, July 31.—Probably Misses King, Burton and Rammuser and Mrs. Cunnella have been murdered at Ho-Shan, province of Shan-Si. There is a local rebellion in the Ning-Po district, and the worst is apprehended for all the workers, who are two married couples and four single ladies."

TORTURING BRESCI. In Strait-Jacket, and Blinding Light Prevents Sleep, but He Is Deaf.

MILAN, Aug. 2.—Torture has been applied to Assassin Bresci to bring a confession from him. He is bound in a strait-jacket, which makes the slightest movement painful. His wrists are bound in gages so tightly that every pulse beat sends thrills of agony through his frame. When he seeks relief in sleep a blinding light is flashed into his eyes. The torture goes to the limit of the law.

The authorities are convinced that Bresci's act was only part of a general conspiracy that involved the killing of other sovereigns. He has retained the torture with nerves of iron. His replies to questions are contemptuous. He declares that the killing was his individual work and that none had foreknowledge of his act.

FASCINATED HIM. Bresci's friends declare he loved his wife dearly, and the American woman who lies ill in West Hoboken declares he was the most devoted of husbands.

How well "La Bella Teresa" wove her spell about the fiery-minded but weak-willed silk worker and steeled his hand and made his nerves of steel is well shown by the manner in which the assassination was done and the demeanor of Bresci under arrest.

"She fascinated him as a snake does a bird," said an Anarchist in Bassi's place to-day.

He was helpless under her dark eyes, whose fires made him forget his wife and child, and a man ready to make any sacrifice, not for the principle that he advocated but for the woman with whom he was madly infatuated.

Count Malatesta had arranged this with truly Satanic craft.

And this strange woman who had suddenly appeared from the tropics never left the shadow of Bresci. His determination had no opportunity to weaken and falter. She saw it grow stronger and stronger every day, mingled with expressions of love for her, until it had grown into a frenzy.

Then did she know that he was safe; that his hand, aimed at the heart of a king, would not tremble and the spirit that animated him would not quail, even in the face of death. If necessary she would stand beside him to steady him when the deed was done.

SHE SAILED WITH BRESCI. The woman went to Newark and Paterson a great deal to be near Bresci.

She sailed with him to Europe. She accompanied him to Paris, where she was arrested and held incommunicado with her husband.

The revolver with which the king was killed was bought on May 1 by Bresci at the hardware store of William H. Ash, Market and Straight streets, Paterson.

MRS. BRESCI GOES AWAY. May Consult Italian Consul About Communicating with Her Husband.

Mrs. Bresci left her home in Hoboken with her baby to-day, and took a Clinton avenue car going toward the ferry. The assassin's wife said yesterday that she was going to see the Italian Consul to-day to consult about communicating with her husband.

ANARCHISTS WATCHED. Little Italy and Other Italian Colonies Are Under Surveillance.

Chief of Detectives McCluskey was asked this morning what the police were doing about watching the Italian colonies and in Little Italy in Harlem. He said: "We are keeping in touch with the matter and I refuse to discuss what we have discovered."

He was asked if Detective-Sergeant Petrosini, the Italian detective, was working on the Anarchist case, and answered: "That's a pretty good guess. I would not put Popary on it, would I?"

### ATTEMPT TO KILL SHAH

The Shah received a letter dated from Italy, signed with an Italian name, but posted in Paris, announcing that he would be assassinated to-day.

The police believe the man who attacked the Shah was not alone in his effort. The whole of the Police Department is at work seeking for his accomplices.

He has chestnut-colored hair, a large mustache and blue-gray eyes. He was dressed in a blouse and wide trousers—the usual clothes of a carpenter.

In his pocket when searched was found an ugly knife, and a handkerchief marked "128th Regiment Infantry." When this was discovered the man said:

ASSASSIN'S NERVE. "That will not add you in your inquiries concerning my identity."

Later in the day to some officials of the household of the Shah who tried to interrogate him the prisoner said:

"YOUR MASTER WILL DO WELL TO RESIGN; OTHERWISE WE WILL KILL HIM."

EYE-WITNESS'S STORY. An eye-witness of the attempted assassination says the courage of the Shah was remarkable. He acted with perfect coolness and was among the first to seize his would-be murderer, holding him with both hands until the man was thrown to the earth by the police.

Another eye-witness of the affair said that when the gate of the Palace opened the first carriage to appear contained the Shah. He sat at the right-hand side of the carriage, with his doctor at his side. Opposite was the Grand Vizier and at his side Gen. Parent, the personal aide of the Shah.

They were on their way to the Pont Alexander III, where they were to take the boat on the Seine for Sevres, to visit the pottery works there. The landau turned to the left toward the Avenue Boi de Boulogne.

# THREAT TO KILL ITALY'S NEW KING.

## Paterson Anarchist Leader's Menace When Told of Bresci's Torture.

When the members of the Anarchist group known as "The Right to Existence" learned to-day that Bresci had been subjected to unusual tortures by the Italian authorities to force a confession they grew furious.

A reporter of The Evening World met a number of the Anarchists as they were leaving the mills for their dinner. One who was recognized as one of the most prominent in last night's meeting was approached. He was shown the despatch telling of the tortures inflicted on the assassin.

"But let the servants of the dead King beware. If the world's Anarchists are aroused, Christendom may shake to its foundation. There is a limit to all abuses. There is a limit even to a monarch's rights. Let them go on with their tortures, but perhaps the so-called royal sons of Italy may find that there is blood in the land as precious as the dead tyrant's, and the echo of another bullet may resound throughout the world."

There was a gleam of fire in his eyes and a flush came to his cheeks. "Oh," he ejaculated, "that is the game, eh? Let them go on. We were fellow-prisoners. Let them tear him limb from limb, he will bear it in silence."

Then he bounded aside, and, standing up in the landau, lifted a cane, a second later bringing it down upon the head of his assailant. At the same moment the Grand Vizier jumped to his feet and seized the man by the arm and twisted his wrist, actually raising him from the ground.

HELD HIM IN AIR. The Grand Vizier is a veritable giant, and without apparent effort he held the aggressor suspended in the air. Then a policeman following on a bicycle jumped from his machine, and, grasping the man, drew him back. Other police arrived and the man was overpowered and led away.

When the officials tried to interrogate the prisoner this afternoon he maintained absolute silence. Nothing would induce him to say a word. He struggled desperately to avoid a picture being taken, and had to be bound hand and foot and his head held between the knees of the photographer's assistant.

The Shah this afternoon took a trip down the Seine to Versailles.

MORE BRESCI ARRESTS. Conspirators with Humbert's Assassin Gathered In—Undoubted Proof of a Plot.

ROME, Aug. 2.—Certain proof that Anarchist Bresci had accomplices in the assassination of King Humbert have been discovered by the secret police. Many new arrests have been made.

Bresci's brother, who is a shoe dealer, and another kinsman named Marozzi, with seven other Anarchists, have been arrested at Prato.

Natale Poesanzini, who was captured at Ancona, admits now that he traveled with Bresci from Milan to Monza.

Bresci has been removed from Monza to Milan, heavily ironed and closely watched to see that he shall not commit suicide.

The prisoner is very excited and violent and has to be forcibly dressed. To-day he exclaimed to a warder: "It will be the Czar's turn next."
