HUNTINGTON'S BODY HAS ARRIVED HERE.

Brought by Special Train from Pine Knot Camp and Taken to Fifth Avenue Home—Funeral to Be Held on Friday.

MR. HUNTINGTON'S PINE KNOT, RAQUETTE LAKE.

Borne on the same train that less than a week ago carried him away in robust health to his picturesque resort, Pine Knot Camp in the Adirondacks, the body of the multi-millionaire, Collis P. Huntington, arrived at the Grand Central Station at 4.30 o'clock this afternoon.

All was ready there for the reception of the body. Those on board the funeral train were Mrs. Huntington, Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Huntington, Miss Campbell, George E. Miles, Mr. Huntington's secretary, William West Durant, Dr. H. H. Warren and the maid and servants in the Huntington household.

The train left Raquette Lake at 8.30 this morning. It consisted of the two cars Onondaga and Onondaga II, a smoker and baggage combined and drawn by the New York Central engine No. 418. With the exception of the engine, the train was one owned by the late Mr. Huntington and the one in which he journeyed to Raquette Lake on Thursday last.

"Distrust All Propositions," Cables Consul Goodnow to Washington.

(Special to The Evening World.) WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 15.—"Distrust all Chinese propositions." This is the advice contained in an important cipher despatch just received from Consul-General Goodnow at Shanghai.

It is understood Consul-General Goodnow referred to the probability of the allies being refused admission to Peking, and intimated that the proposed negotiations through Li Hung Chang for a cessation of hostilities are for the sole purpose of saving Peking from attack and capture.

It is believed Mr. Goodnow's despatch is in the nature of a warning. It will be hurried to Gen. Chaffee for his information.

ALLIES IN PEKING NOW, SO LONDON BELIEVES.

LONDON, Aug. 15.—The allies have almost certainly arrived at Peking, even though rain has been falling. The advices received from the British commander at the front through Rear-Admiral Bruce give reasonable assurance that the twenty-seven miles between the allied forces and Peking would be easily traversed in four days, the Chinese, seemingly, being unwilling to fight and falling back on the capital.
