GERMANY REFUSES AMERICA'S OFFER

Declines to Recognize Li Hung Chang, Who Has Been Seized as a Hostage by the Admirals at Taku.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—Germany has returned a flat-footed dissent to the circular note of this Government requesting the Powers to state their willingness to recognize Earl Li Hung Chang's credentials to treat for peace on behalf of China.

Great Britain and Russia are agreed with the United States that Earl Li's credentials are sufficient, but Germany is the only power which has dissented. The three replies were read to-day at the Cabinet meeting. Our circular note sent to our agents abroad asked replies to the questions:

- First—The willingness of the Powers to accept Li's credentials. Second—To ascertain what the future policy of each power is to be.

KRUGER AT LAST CRUSHED IN BATTLE BY BRITISH.

LORENZO MAQUIGUES, DELAGOOA BAY, Aug. 28.—Heavy fighting is reported to have occurred at Machodorp. The Boers are said to have been defeated with great loss, leaving their guns and ammunition in the hands of the British.

LI HELD CAPTIVE BY THE ADMIRALS.

PARIS, Aug. 28.—Admiral Courrejolles, the French commander in Chinese waters, cables that a council of the Admirals has notified the foreign legations at Peking that it has been decided to hold Li Hung Chang on board ship until the diplomats have consented to open negotiations with the Chinese.

LONDON, Aug. 28.—The Chinese officials have informed the foreign Consuls at Shanghai that the Emperor, the Dowager Empress and Prince Tuan have arrived in the neighborhood of Tai-Yuan-Fu, the capital of the province of Shan-Si, 240 miles southwest of Peking.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—At the Cabinet meeting to-day it was decided to put ten despatch boats on the line between Chefoo and Shanghai, as the fact that Gen. Chaffee has not received any despatches since Aug. 14 shows the land lines are being tapped by the Chinese.

ALLIES NOT DEFEATED.

Washington Refuses to Believe that Chinese Troops Have Retaken Peking.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—No confirmation comes from any quarter of the report from Russian sources that the Chinese have recaptured Peking and the War Department officials here completely discredit the story. They believe it is capable of explanation, however, when read in the light of Minister Tanager's statement yesterday that the allied Generals had decided not to enter the Imperial palace, and also in view of the press reports of the sudden abandonment by the American and Russian troops of the attack on the palace gates after capturing four out of five of them.

PEKING IS IN RUINS.

PARIS, Aug. 28.—A despatch from the French Minister at Peking says that one of the principal anxieties is the establishment of communications by railroads and telegraph with Tientsin, continuing M. Pichou's report: "The insecurity of the route makes this difficult but urgent. A suspension of the offensive by the Japanese and regular troops is feared, and serious caution must be taken. I am today at the Spanish legation. All my relations and domestic are in Tientsin. The greater part of the town is in ruins."

PANIC AT AMOY.

Consul Johnson Cables that Foreigners and Rich Chinese Are Leaving City.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—A cablegram has been received at the State Department from United States Consul Johnson at Amoy, China, relative to the rioting in progress in that city. He reports that many of the richer Chinese and Europeans are leaving the place. A cablegram received at the Navy Department announces that the Casine sailed to-day from Shanghai for Amoy in accordance with the Department's orders. She should arrive there Thursday of this week.
