Another Woman Charges Him with Beating Her with a Cane—He Denies It, but May Settle.

Two trainloads of passengers were shaken up badly at 3 o'clock this afternoon in a rear-end collision on the Kings County Elevated at Fulton and Tillary streets, Brooklyn. No one was hurt seriously, but a score were lamed and jolted about roughly.

The collision was between a motor train from the bridge and a steam train from Fulton ferry. Both were going uptown. The motor car left the track as it rounded the Tillary street bridge curve onto the main track, leaving the passenger coach broadside on the uptown rails. Running his locomotive backward, the engineer of the steam train did not see the accident until too late to stop. The locomotive crashed its tender into the stalled passenger car with a great smash, throwing the car off the rails. The locomotive also left the track and tumbled nearly into the street. It hung in midair for two hours, blocking the street below and the tracks above. The trains were not heavily loaded. No one was on the smashed side of the passenger coach, as it was the sunny side.

LI HUNG WANTS YANKEE TROOPS.

Asks Us to Give Him an Escort to Peking—Britain's Stand.

LONDON, Sept. 7.—A despatch from Shanghai says Li Hung Chang has made a request for an American escort to accompany him on his journey to Peking, and that United States Consul Goodnow is considering his request.

The British Foreign Office has allowed it to become definitely known that the British Government is of the opinion that it is advisable for the allied forces to remain at Peking until satisfactory arrangements for peace are concluded with the Chinese Government.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—This Government may appoint a commission of five, three or two members to act in the peace settlement in China.

the forces of all the powers from Peking, leaving an international guard to protect the legations, which, it is further asserted, will be allowed to remain at the Chinese capital pending a peace settlement.

The main body of troops, it is also said, will retire to the neighborhood of Tientsin, leaving sufficient forces along the road to keep open the route and railroad between Peking and Tientsin.

Russia's attitude is interpreted here as meaning that she will withdraw her troops outside the walls of Peking, but not necessarily a great distance from the city.

SADIE LAZARUS AND HER NEW HOME.

BOSTON, Mass., Sept. 7.—Fathers who have always had their children to talk to and pet and to greet them on their return home each day, and those who have never known what a void in life a missing parent creates, can hardly appreciate the joy Joseph Lazarus and his twelve-year-old daughter Sadie take in each other's society.

It is only a few weeks since Sadie, now twelve years old, heard that she had a father. Now she sits beside him in their little home at 47A Dudley street, Roxbury, and tells him that they will never part again.

It's an odd story, the parting of this fond father and affectionate daughter. When little Sadie was a mite of a baby her mother died. They lived in New York then and in a few months Mr. Lazarus fell ill. Doctors said he could not recover and friends took little Sadie to care for her and bring her up, in ignorance that she was not an orphan.

Weeks later, when Lazarus recovered from what was expected would be a fatal illness, he asked for Sadie. "She has gone away for a while," they told him.

William Bullock, a negro confined in the Monmouth County Jail at Freehold, N. J., since Nov. 14 last, charged with the murder of Officer James Walsh, of Red Bank, escaped by burrowing his way out of his cell early this morning.

Bullock had cut a hole through the cement floor which leads into a passageway for sewer and water pipes, the whole length of the jail, large enough for a man to crawl through.

From there Bullock had easy work until he got to the rear wall of the prison, eighteen feet away, which he burrowed under and got out in the yard, which is surrounded by a twelve-foot board fence.
