NEW PLOT TO MURDER ALL KINGS.

Paris Police Expose Anarchist Plans for Slaughter of Rulers.

KINGS MARKED FOR DEATH. LEOPOLD II—King of the Belgians. VICTOR EMANUEL III—King of Italy. GEORGE I—King of the Hellenes. WILLIAM II—Emperor of Germany.

There is great activity among the French secret police and certain notorious anarchists are being closely watched.

Emissaries of Malatesta have arrived here from London, and a number of Italians from Paterson, N. J., are also here and in conference.

The Government believes that a plot is on foot to kill every crowned head in Europe.

SECRET SERVICE MEN HAVE EVIDENCE THAT TEN ANARCHISTS HAVE BEEN ASSIGNED TO ASSASSINATE EACH POTENTATE TO LESSEN THE CHANCES OF ESCAPE.

A special effort will be made to murder King Victor Emmanuel III. of Italy for the sake of the moral effect this would have following so closely on Humbert's death.

A despatch from Berlin says the Kaiser wears a shirt of mail now and his sleep is troubled by nightmares, due to the fear of assassination.

King Leopold of Belgium, it is reported, is likely to abdicate, owing to his terror of Anarchists. He is being tracked by assassins.

King George of Greece is one of the Monarchs marked for death.

POPE ALSO CONDEMNED?

ROME, Sept. 8.—It is reported that the police have secured information from America that the Anarchists have condemned the Pope to death. The Vatican authorities are taking great precautions for the Pope's protection.

WOMAN STARTLES THE WHITE HOUSE.

Insists on Seeing Mr. McKinley and Makes a Painful Scene.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—A woman, giving her name as Mrs. Rosa Heiking, created a scene at the White House this afternoon.

About a week ago the woman presented herself at the Executive Mansion and, according to the statement of the policeman on duty, said she wanted to see the President, as some one was trying to kill her and her children.

She was told that the President did not receive callers at that hour, 4 o'clock, and she went away.

To-day she came again and insisted on seeing the President. The messengers and watchmen on duty at the door sought to pacify and induce her to leave the house.

She grew more excited, however, crying hysterically, and at last a carriage from the House of Detention was called and the woman was led down the basement stairs and through the flower garden at the east front of the house.

While being assisted into the carriage she screamed at the top of her voice, which attracted the attention of the

ROOSEVELT: "I'M DUTCH."

His Speech to Hollanders on Last Day of Michigan Tour.

HOLLAND, Mich., Sept. 8.—Gov. Roosevelt began the closing day of his flying tour through Michigan by addressing a large audience composed almost wholly of Hollanders and their descendants.

The Governor evidently took pride in being able to address them as fellow Dutchmen. President Kollen, of Hope College, and a delegation of Holland citizens met the Governor at Grand Rapids and came through with him. In the Holland City Park a crowd of 2,000 was waiting.

President Kollen said: "Gov. Roosevelt was born a Dutchman." In acknowledging this compliment with a laugh opened his address with: "My fellow Dutchmen."

This set the crowd cheering, and some of the old settlers yelled Dutch salutes, and Roosevelt, responding said:

SWEeper's BAD DAY.

Run Over Twice Within a Few Hours by Butcher Wagons and Now in Hospital.

John Deery, fifty years old, a street sweeper living at 222 Second avenue, was run over twice in less than two hours to-day.

Deery was working in front of 115 East One Hundred and Sixteenth street at 8 o'clock when he was knocked down by a butcher wagon driven by Edward Weisner. He was not badly hurt, and after being attended by a doctor, went back to work.

At 8:50 o'clock Deery was working at Fifth avenue and One Hundred and sixteenth street when another butcher wagon driven by Francis Wursburg ran over him, shattering his right leg and fracturing his body. He was taken to Haven Hospital.

Wursburg, who was arrested, was discharged in the Harlem Court.

SHOOTER GETS BAIL.

Marlin Waldman, who shot Manager John Kane, of the Sharon Hotel, at 154 Third avenue, and John Allen, a customer, on Wednesday morning last, was admitted to bail in \$1,000 by Magistrate Meade in the Yorkville Police Court this morning.

This was done at the request of Lawyers Abraham Levy and Sol Rosenthal, who declared that the two men, who are in Bellevue Hospital, were not mortally wounded. The six customers of the place, who were arrested at the time of the shooting as witnesses, were discharged.

M'DOWELL'S BRIDE HAS HIM ARRESTED.

Baltimore Widow with Whom Actor Eloped in June Charges Cruelty and Will Sue for Divorce.

Melbourne MacDowell, the actor, was arrested at the Brevoort House this afternoon by Deputy Sheriff Walgering on complaint of his wife, Wilhelmina Maria Brafman, who charges him with cruelty to her.

Mrs. MacDowell complained to Justice MacAdam yesterday that since their marriage last June, MacDowell has constantly ill treated her.

In her complaint Mrs. MacDowell avers that she and her husband went to London last month and that he drank heavily. Once, she says, he fought her, striking her with his fist and tearing her dress to shreds.

The couple arrived at the Brevoort House a fortnight ago. There, the complaint continues, the actor asked his wife to "get another man." She also alleges that he beat her.

M'KINLEY POLICY IN CHINA!

President Decides to Act Alone and Recall Troops from Peking.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8. The President has decided to pursue an independent course in China.

He is convinced that concurrent action of the powers cannot be secured without prolonged delay, if at all.

He is thoroughly irritated at the dilatory methods evidenced by all the nations and the period of waiting will not be permitted much longer to continue.

FIRST—To withdraw American troops from Peking. SECOND—To open communication with the Imperial Government, steps to that end having directly been taken through Minister Wu and Li Hung Chang.

THIRD—The appointment at an early date of envoys to represent this Government in negotiations for indemnity and future guarantees.

In making this programme effective every American soldier can be brought out of China before the November elections.

By pursuing this independent course the other powers will be left free to prosecute independent wars.

The President is already considering those eligible for appointment as envoys to negotiate with China.

ACTING WITH RUSSIA?

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 8.—It is believed in well-informed circles here that the adherence of the United States and France to Russia's proposal to withdraw the troops of the Powers from Peking may now be relied upon.

OUTBREAK FEARED IN BRITISH CHINA.

HONGKONG, British China, Sept. 8.—Owing to anticipations of disturbances at to-night's celebration of the Feast of Lanterns elaborate preparations have been made to cope with eventualities.

The troops have been served with forty rounds of ball cartridges and have been confined to their barracks. Six Maxim guns are also in readiness.

The police have been ordered to suppress the Dragon Procession, but the Chinese declare they must hold it in spite of the authorities.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—Acting Secretary of State Hill authorizes the announcement that a telegram from Commissioner Hill, dated Shanghai, Sept. 6, stated that missionaries are arriving from the West and Northwest and report quiet everywhere along the route.

Only four Northwest provinces indicate signs of disturbance. BERLIN, Sept. 8.—A despatch from Shanghai says: The staff surgeon of the German Legation announces that an examination shows the cause of Baron von Kettler's death to have been a bullet through the neck, which must have been instantaneously fatal.

"At the funeral Minister Comper made a stirring speech to the diplomatic body. All the foreign detachments were present."
