"Do you think they'll take my house away from me for that Mary Redmond? Well, well, it serves me right, for I was more than eighty-eight when I met her last year, and she was an old maid of sixty-eight years old and bigger than three of me and three the likes of you thrown in."

"We were brought together by Mrs. Mary Christie, who kept a little grocery in Linwood street. She told me Mary Redmond had \$500 and that we'd make a fine couple and she'd take good care of me. I thought the \$500 would go a long way toward paying off the mortgage I have to forward, the undertaker, when my wife died and my boy Willie and my son-in-law, Policeman John Nolan, were blown off a steamboat by fireworks at Springfield and were drowned in the Connecticut River on the Fourth of July three years ago."

"And so Mary Christie and her husband took me and Mary Redmond to 'Father Manahan, down in the big black stone church in Throop avenue, one evening last year and married me to her, straightening me out when I was just eight-and-eighty years old. 'I'd sell the house and give the money to my girl and run away, only I can't sell it without her name—my wife's name—on the deed. What chance is there for an old man like me against a woman?'"

Broker's Wife Says He Is Under Hypnotic Spell.

With tears in her eyes Mrs. Barbara Green declared at her home, 140 West One Hundred and Third street, this morning that Mrs. Mary J. Haynes, of 77 West One Hundred and Fourth street, had hypnotized her husband, Edward W. Green, a commission broker of 377 Broadway, whom she charges with deserting her for Mrs. Haynes. The latter is a boarding-house keeper and the Greens formerly lived in her house.

"For six years past," Mrs. Green told a reporter of The Evening World, "my life has been miserable through the doings of this woman. No one knows how I have suffered. 'Oh, the infamy! Mrs. Haynes had over my husband was something indescribable,'" continued Mrs. Green. "Why, he wouldn't take me out unless I consented that she go along with us. 'Once or twice I thought I had my husband weaned away from her, but she drew him back. All she had to do was to cast her eyes upon him and he was her servant. He would do anything she asked him."

"Matters became so bad that I left the house and my husband followed me, but it was only to avoid scandal. Mrs. Green cried bitterly as she continued her story. 'I went away to Sullivan County. While up there I received several letters from friends telling me that my husband was again infatuated with Mrs. Haynes and was visiting her. I wrote to him and he admitted it. He told me he loved her better than he did me and refused to support me any longer. When I came home I found Mrs. Haynes and begged she leave my husband alone. She called me names and put me out of her house. Mrs. Haynes when seen this morning denied Mrs. Green's statements. The woman is of a jealous, nervous temperament. She has annoyed me for three years, and I was finally forced to eject her husband and herself from my house. Only the other day she came to my door and created a scene. Mrs. Green is a very nice man. Mrs. Haynes continued, 'and I am real sorry for him that this matter has so ruined public that is all I have to say. Mrs. Green is a tall blonde and about thirty years old. He has kept the boarding-house for six years."

Jeans jumped into the smoking-car on the other side. Yesterday Jarrell received a note from his wife admitting she had eloped and recommending that he secure a divorce.

"L" ROAD BLOCKED.

Engine Disabled on Kings County Road and Trains Suspended in the Rush Hour. Brooklynites who rely on the Kings County branch of the Brooklyn elevated system to convey them to Manhattan had the pleasure of paying two fares this morning or waiting close to an hour for a train. At 7:30 o'clock the piston rod of a down-bound engine of a Fulton street train snapped as it was passing Troy avenue. The road was blocked for forty-five minutes until some one concluded to shove the disabled engine down to Franklin avenue, where it was switched on to the Brighton Beach division and the main track cleared. Meanwhile, at all stations along the line the sale of tickets went merrily on, while wayfarers fumed at the non-arrival of trains.
