ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 14.—Count Leo Tolstoy, the novelist, is reported seriously ill on his estate. His great age and his radical notions concerning medicine and physicians render his condition threatening. The cause of the illness is not known.

GERMAN LOAN IS OFFERED HERE. Official Announcement that \$20,000,000 and Over Will Be Raised in This Country.

BERLIN, Sept. 14.—It is officially announced by the Board of Directors of the Disconto-Gesellschaft that with the co-operation of the Imperial Bank and through the intermediary of the Disconto-Gesellschaft, the Norddeutsche Bank of Hamburg, the W. M. Warburg Company, of Hamburg, and Kuhn, Loeb and Co., of New York, acting in conjunction with the National City Bank, of New York, they have taken over 80,000,000 marks of 4 per cent. Treasury bonds of the German Empire, falling due in 1904 and 1905.
