

KENNEDY'S WIFE GREETES HIM IN HIS DEATH CELL.



DR. KENNEDY'S WIFE AND BABY.

Brave Little Woman Has Fought Against Desperate Odds to Save Him from the Death-Chair.

She Has Never Doubted Her Husband's Protests of Innocence of Dolly Reynolds's Murder.

Mrs. Marion S. Kennedy, the wife of Dr. Samuel J. Kennedy, who is to have a new trial for the murder of Dolly Reynolds, will accompany him on his journey from Sing Sing, where he has been confined for more than a year under sentence of death, to the Tombs, where he will be held pending and during his new trial, when the devoted little woman is confident will give him his freedom.

A remarkable scene was that in the death chamber at Sing Sing when the wife arrived there this morning. She had been there many times before, always helpful and confident that her husband would be vindicated, even when the prospect seemed darkest. On April 13 of last year hers were the lips that told that there had been a stay of execution, and at the same time she expressed her belief that a new trial would be granted.

She had infused him with her own courage, her own hopefulness, and this morning, when she stood before his cell and looked at his pale drawn face, the only words she uttered were:

"Thank God, it has come at last!"

Both in Tears.

"At last!" repeated the man. Then he burst into tears, and the sound of his sobbing mingled with hers. She was not permitted to approach the door of the cell, but her eyes and her outstretched hands told plainly that she would like to have thrown herself on the breast of the man whom she has so bravely defended and for whose life she has worked unceasingly.

She stood at the iron screen that stands between the visitors and the cell door, her tearful eyes bright with the happiness she felt. All the other men who have been Kennedy's companions in that grim place, watched day and night like dangerous beasts, felt a reaction of the joy that had come to him and the woman outside.

Molliness in Tears.

Mollineux, standing at his cell, his hands grasping the bars, cried out: "I most heartily congratulate you and your husband, Mrs. Kennedy!" She endeavored to reply, but the tears choked her voice, making a plaintive, pitiful sound. Mollineux's lips quivered, his eyes moistened and down his set face trickled two tears. He walked back to his couch and sat down, his face in his hands.

Others of the men in the shadow of death, to whom no ray of hope had come as it had to the man sentenced for Dolly Reynolds's murder, shouted out their good wishes and kind words for the brave wife. And there was a light in the heart of every man who makes the heart vibrate to the touch of sympathy and pain that has long waited—waiting helplessly for death.

Mrs. Kennedy soon afterward gained her composure and chatted for a long time with her husband. She decided to stay at Sing Sing until the papers arrived transferring him from the prison there to the Tombs.

Her Faith Sublime.

Even when the evidence of the crime collected by the detectives was beyond controversy, the wife never faltered, never doubted, never wavered. It was due to her energies that the work for the appeal of the case was pushed, and she has been so tireless in her work that she has found several new witnesses, it is said, who will throw a light on the case when it comes to trial.

When she received the news last evening that a new trial had been granted, Mrs. Kennedy, singing like a light-hearted girl, fairly danced about her cell.

home at New Dorp, S. I. Then she cried a 40. Then laugher.

She dressed herself as though about to go to a party with a gay flutter of ribbon here and there. She lit up the house as though she expected company. And company came, indeed. All of the neighbors flocked in to congratulate her to express the hope that the new trial would restore her husband to her. The doctor is popular at New Dorp, of which his father is an old resident.

And this morning Mrs. Kennedy was up bright and early. This was to be her last visit yet to the gray old prison at Sing Sing. Her friends, who accompanied her to the station, told her that she looked ten years younger. "I am so happy," said she, "that I feel as though I am."

USED SIGNALS TO TRAP HIS WIFE.

Fire Captain Rickel is Now Suing for a Divorce.

The trial of Charles E. Rickel's divorce suit against his wife Annie began in the Brooklyn Supreme Court to-day. J. P. Miller is named as co-respondent by the husband, who is captain of Engine Company 104.

The testimony showed that Mrs. Florence Hill had been engaged to take the front room at the house in Grove street where Mr. Rickel was living. She was to pose as a dressmaker. A private detective was stationed in the street, and when there was any evidence of the wife's misconduct the "dressmaker" planned to stick a sheet of paper in the window as a signal.

This signal appeared, it is said, on Aug. 1 last and Capt. Rickel was notified by telephone.

With two assistants from the engine house he went to his wife's rooms and it was said, elicited Miller, hatpins and coatless. This morning the man's discarded coat was presented in court as evidence.
