Paris Editor, Wild at His Thrashing, Says He'll Wipe Out Insult in Blood.

Seconds Have Been Exchanged and Boulevards Are Waiting for the Battle—Story of the "Affair."

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PARIS, March 14—9 P. M. Count Boni de Castellane has just told The Evening World correspondent that he expects De Rodays's seconds at any moment.

The encounter, owing to the gravity of the insult, may take place at dawn to-morrow. Each man says he will do his level best to kill the other.

The following statement was given out by Count Boni de Castellane this afternoon: "Reading the Figaro, I was filled with indignation at the perfidious insinuation accusing me of treachery."

"I reserve a similar one for any person permitting himself the same accusations." DE CASTELLANE.

\$1,000 VERDICT AGAINST CRANE.

O'Neill Wins the Suit Against Magistrate for Part of Fee.

A verdict of \$1,000 was given today by the jury in favor of Lawyer Thomas J. O'Neill against City Magistrate Leroy B. Crane in O'Neill's suit to recover \$1,750 which he claimed, was his share of the fee of \$15,000 paid by Peter F. Meyer, Dock Commissioner and partner of Richard Croker, to settle the breach of promise suit of Emma Von Haven in New York.

O'Neill sued Crane as being the active partner of his brother, Royal S. Crane, now dead. Leroy B. Crane was appointed a Magistrate by Mayor Strong six years ago, and the Meyer suit was returned after he took his seat on the bench.
