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Odell Meets Platt and Says: "I AM AGAINST POLICE BILL."

AGUINALDO MAY BE A PRISONER.

Gen. Funston Expected at Manila on the Gunboat Vicksburg After a Two Weeks' Chase for the Insurgent.



GEN. FUNSTON.

MANILA, March 22.—The gunboat Vicksburg, expected here to-morrow, may have Aguinaldo, the Filipino leader, on board, a prisoner. Gen. Funston, with a picked force of scouts, has been off two weeks on an expedition looking to the capture of the insurgent. With his party he sailed on the gunboat, and few look for an unsuccessful trip. The project promises to be the greatest and most romantic achievement of Funston's eventful career. In January, from his hiding place in the province of Isabella, Aguinaldo wrote letters anathematizing the subchiefs who had taken the oath of allegiance to the United States. Later he ordered certain insurgent forces in Southern Luzon to join him at a rendezvous in Isabella province. The rebel officer entrusted with the orders secretly negotiated with the Americans. On securing necessary information Gen. Funston planned Aguinaldo's capture, and with Gen. MacArthur's authorization proceeded to make the attempt. Gen. Funston, with Surgeon-Major Harris, Capt. Plans Were Laid to Enter Aguinaldo's Camp and Seize Him Through the Aid of Filipinos.

It was arranged that Aguinaldo's emissary, with the native scouts, should pass themselves off as insurgent troops who, having captured Funston and others, were taking them as prisoners to Aguinaldo. At the right time, when brought before Aguinaldo, Funston was to give a signal, when the tables were to be turned and Aguinaldo was to be seized. Six days' march into the interior was contemplated. Treachery was considered possible, but every precaution was taken. The troops in New Visaya and New Bolja and the gunboats Vicksburg and Albany were to co-operate with Gen. Funston's force.

FILIPINOS KILLED IN FIGHT. Sharp Clash with Cavalry in Tabig—Col. Rosario Surrenders. MANILA, March 22.—Col. Rosario, with fifty-one men and fifty-six rifles, has surrendered to Col. Baldwin, of the Fourth Infantry, at San Francisco de Malabon, Cavite Province. Lieut. Dean, of Troop C, Sixth Cavalry, engaged a force of insurgents at Tabig, Laguna Province, killing several of them and capturing seven men and twenty-four rifles.

MOBBED ROCKEFELLER'S COACHMAN AFTER COLLISION

Valentine Unold, twenty-one years old, of No. 19 East One Hundred and Fourteenth street, while riding a bicycle at Fifth avenue and Forty-first street this afternoon, was knocked down and run over by a carriage owned by John D. Rockefeller. The coachman started to drive off after the accident, but was prevented by the crowd which collected, and pulled the coachman from his seat. Unold was not hurt, however, and refused to make a complaint, and the coachman was allowed to proceed.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 23.—The Students' Organization Committee has issued a call inviting all intelligent members of Russian society to join their ranks in the struggle for freedom.

agents from European cities in other States. To-morrow the police will be distributed in force through all the streets of St. Petersburg and Moscow, and domiciliary visits have already taken place. While in St. Petersburg the authorities were at their wits' ends to protect the Czar's life. Five desks were placed in his study at which he sat at different times, so that no one could tell where he would be sitting at any given moment. The doors of his study and bed-chambers were fitted with a patent automatic alarm and mechanism, the secrets of which were known only to his body attendants. The walls of his bed-chambers and rooms most used by him were lined with steel, while a Siberian Tartar, whose knowledge of poisons is very great, is constantly employed to taste the imperial food. Not a dish is touched until this man has first eaten of it. The secret police in Berlin and Paris and the detectives here believe that the recrudescence of Nihilism is due to a league between the leaders of the radical element in Russia and the Anarchists of Italy and France. They recall the attempts, successful and otherwise, recently made on other monarchs, and connect them with the assassination propaganda in Russia. The menacing aspect of civil affairs in the Empire has had much to do with the curbing of Russia's policy in the Far East, and the Nihilists themselves.

SPAIN GETS PAY FOR ISLANDS.

Secretary Hay Hands Over \$100,000 for Cagayan Group.

WASHINGTON, March 22.—Secretary Hay to-day gave to the Spanish Minister, Duke D'Arco, a Treasury warrant for \$100,000, in payment for the island of Cagayan and other islands near the Philippine group. The payment was made in accordance with the terms of a treaty negotiated last November. To-day, also, protocols were signed, exchanging final ratifications which confirm the title of the United States to these islands.

BOTHA OBJECTS TO MILNER.

Reason Why England's Surrender Terms Were Rejected.

LONDON, March 22.—The Colonial Secretary, Mr. Chamberlain, in the House of Commons, to-day replying to a question, said no specific objections had been made by Gen. Botha to any of the peace terms offered by Gen. Kitchener, and Gen. Botha made no counter proposals. The only information in the possession of the Government, outside of that published in the papers, was contained in a private telegram from Gen. Kitchener, saying Gen. Botha had objections to Sir Alfred Milner.

WRECKED ON FLORIDA COAST.

Steamer Stranded and Fishing Smack Lost in Heavy Storm.

PENSACOLA, Fla., March 22.—A severe blow from the southeast did considerable damage to shipping in this harbor. One sailor is thought to have been drowned. The Russian bark Libto and the Russian ship Loch were in collision, both being damaged. The schooner Irene was beached. The Italian bark Adelle was damaged by the arting of her anchor chains. Near St. Andrew's Pass the fishing smack, Maud Miller was wrecked. It is not known if the crew was rescued. The Austrian troop steamer Styria was stranded on French reef, forty miles from Miami.



Quigg, Hobart Krum and a score of others had gathered at the hotel and greeted the Governor. The Governor settled down to a two-hours' talk with Mr. Platt. It was said that he told the Senator firmly at the start: "I am opposed to any State Police bill or general police bill taking away home rule from New York."

Mr. Griggs intends to leave Washington on Saturday next for his home in New Jersey, where hereafter he will reside. His intention is to resume immediately the practice of his profession. It is stated that he will be associated at counsel with the firm of Bill, Bomelzier & Baldwin, of New York City. Mr. Griggs also has formed a partnership with Mr. Bill, of Jersey City, under the firm name of Griggs & Bill, for practice in New Jersey.
