

# BEATEN IN SHOP BY BOLD THUGS.

## Junkman Let in Burglars Who Robbed Him of \$274.

Owen Ahearn, known as "Jimmy the Junkman," whose shop is opposite the Navy Yard, at No. 44 Flushing avenue, Brooklyn, sleeping in a rear room of his shop, while his family reside on the floor above.

At 4 o'clock this morning he was awakened by a rap at his door. He admitted two well-dressed men. One of them he recognized as a former customer.

"Why, it's later than I thought," said one, "what time have you, Jimmy?"

Ahearn turned to look at his clock and was hit on the back of the head by one man and knocked down by the other.

Ahearn is a powerful man and he fought his assailants about the room. Finally one of them picked up a hammer and put "Jimmy" to sleep with a blow on the forehead.

He revived presently, finding his pockets turned inside out and the pair searching his bedroom. He again showed fight, but the hammer was too much for him.

The place was vacant on his second awakening. He crawled to a window and discharged his revolver to attract the police.

Before going to the Brooklyn Hospital Ahearn found he had been robbed of \$274 in cash and a check for \$149, drawn by Andrew Watson to bearer.

# NICKEL PLATE WORKS BURN.

## An Early Morning Fire Destroys Property Worth \$22,000.

Fire which started in No. 36 Withers street, Brooklyn, early to-day, destroyed two buildings and damaged two others, causing a loss of \$22,000.

The fire was discovered at 1 A. M. in the rag shop of Joseph Michaels at No. 36.

This is a three-story frame building. The flames were sweeping through it when the firemen arrived and a second alarm was rung.

Despite their efforts the fire caught the Red-Burns Nickel Plating Works at No. 40. A third alarm was then sent in.

The tenants of the houses adjoining were hurried in alarm to the street, as for a time it looked as if the block would go.

The fire caught the three-story frame building No. 31 Withers street, owned by John Muzella, and travelled around the corner to the one-story frame building No. 19 Jackson street, owned by Michael Wood.

The firemen saved the two latter buildings, but No. 36 and the nickel plating works were destroyed.

The loss on No. 36 was \$6,000 and on the plating works \$16,000.

# HUNT FOR A MAN'S BODY.

## Shot at Twice in Chase He Went Into the Tunnel.

All night policemen searched with lanterns for a man's body in the tunnel at Lafayette place. He is Arthur Weiland, of No. 106 East Fourth street.

Weiland was walking down the Bowery when at Fourth street he met his wife and Joseph Sullivan, twenty-one years old, of No. 23 Madison street, and a relative of Senator Tim Sullivan.

A fight followed. Sullivan pulled a revolver, and that Sullivan defended her. Weiland ran to the tunnel and Sullivan shot at him twice. He either fell or jumped into the tunnel.

James Burke, of No. 318 Delancey street, and Arthur Silet, twenty-eight years old, of No. 15 First avenue, were also arrested. A revolver with two empty cartridge shells was found in Sullivan's pocket.

FELL SIX STORIES UNHURT.

Elevator Cables Broke with Two Men on Board.

John Marco, of No. 33 East Fifty-fourth street, and Michael Claco, of No. 216 Second street, were making repairs in the clear box factory at No. 25-29 Monroe street, at 10 A. M. to-day.

They loaded the freight elevator with lumber and got in the car. When the elevator reached the sixth floor the cables broke and the car shot to the cellar.

The men escaped unhurt except for a few bruises.

# JAIL BURNED; INMATES SAFE.

## Prisoners in Panic from Fire That Swept Up-State Village.

(Special to The Evening World.)

MAYVILLE, N. Y., April 18.—All the principal buildings in this village were destroyed by a blaze that wiped out the business section. The Chautauque County Jail was gutted, but all the prisoners were taken out safely. The loss was \$20,000.

The fire started in the rear of the Opera-House block on the east side of Main street and spread north and south. The fire companies of Chautauque were summoned and came by teams. St. Paul's Episcopal Church was soon aflame and the fire spread from this structure to the jail, in which forty prisoners were confined. The prisoners were thrown into a panic and made frantic efforts to escape.

The Sheriff summoned a posse and removed them in iron to the basement of his residence. Later the dwelling was swept by the flames, and again the prisoners were removed. This time they were taken out in the open and placed in the City Jail.

After the fire was gotten under control they were locked up in the City Clerk's office.

No cause can be ascribed for the blaze, but there is talk of incendiaries and the district Attorney has begun an investigation.

# 6 MEN HELD HIM BEFORE CAMERA

## "Schindler the Swindler" Gave Detectives a Tough Tussle.

Six brawny detectives carried one little man from the detention room at Police Headquarters to-day to the photographing room. Capt. Titus's desperate guest was Charles Schindler, thirty-seven years old, who is known to the police of the country as "Harry Schindler the swindler."
