


TREED TO BETRAY U. S. SECRET PAPERS

WASHINGTON, May 11.—An attempt to sell the confidential communications between the Attorney-General and the Secretary of War in the Neely case was unearthed today by Chief Wilkie, of the Secret Service.

Information had been obtained from Judge John D. Lindsay, counsel for Neely, in New York, who had received a letter signed John H. Dickenson, offering him copies of the correspondence. Judge Lindsay turned the matter over to the Attorney-General yesterday. The latter called in Chief Wilkie and placed the matter in his hands.

LOSS OF MONEY LED TO SUICIDE.

Brooding Over Losses Willishauer Hanged Himself.

Haunted by the fear that he was about to lose his money, Jacob Willishauer, a wealthy contractor and builder, hanged himself this afternoon at his home, No. 82 West End avenue.

His wife went upstairs to call him for dinner soon after 1 o'clock. The hall was not well lighted and she brushed against his body hanging to a balcony-trail on the second landing.

She screamed loudly for help. Servants rushed to her and word was at once sent to Dr. S. Olin Hardy, of No. 912 West End street. The man was dead when the doctor arrived.

Mr. Willishauer had tied a new rope which he had purchased this morning, around his throat. He had tied the other end to the stairpost and thrown his body forward on the landing, strangling himself.

He had been ill for six months and had suffered great pain from an abscess behind one of his ears. In addition to this he worried constantly about his business affairs. It was said that he had lost considerable money lately in Wall street, but his wife denies this, she insists that he was all right financially.

Mr. Willishauer was sixty years old. He had several grown-up sons.
