VOTE FOR STRIKE ON SOUTHERN R'WAY

WASHINGTON, May 28.—Ninety-seven per cent. of the machinists in the employ of the Southern Railway have voted to strike for the nine-hour day and are now only awaiting the order of President James O'Connell, of the International Association of Machinists, before going out.

DOUBLE KILLING.

PAWTUCKET, R. I., May 28.—Adam Martineau, of Lincoln, R. I., murdered his wife by shooting her this afternoon. A farm hand who interfered was shot in the arm and before Martineau could be caught he killed himself. He was about thirty-five years of age.

Treasury Buys Bonds.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—The Secretary of the Treasury to-day bought three small lots of bonds. For \$35,000 short he paid \$113.75 and for \$3,950 short he paid \$113.91. The total purchase to date for the sinking fund is \$9,451,720.
