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CINCINNATI BATTERS HIT DOHENY'S CURVES.

JEROME RAIDS IN NEW MANNER.

A pool-room raid which Justice Jerome says brings the Committee of Fifteen closer to the head of the gambling combine than any other was made this afternoon on the second floor of No. 38 Beaver street.

Descends Upon Beaver Street Place Without Telling Precinct Police—Parkhurst Men with Him.

Justice Jerome used new tactics in the raid. Instead of going to the Old Slip station, in whose precinct the pool-room was located, he went to the East Twenty-second street precinct and, getting a policeman there, drove down to Beaver street with the Parkhurst men in cars.
