"SHE KILLED HERSELF FOR GRIEF," HUSBAND SAYS.

John Collyer Swears that His Wife Confessed Her Guilt, Implicating His Own Brother—Both Men Under Arrest.



ing by his wife at the side of the bed trying to staunch the blood that flowed from a deep wound in her throat. On the bed with her was her four-month-old baby and on the floor was an open razor. With his face filled with terror Collyer said: "I loved her. I loved her, but she has killed herself. She confessed to me and I forgave her. I came back to forgive her again. But see, she has killed herself. I would forgive her a thousand times. She was my life, my love." The police were notified by the neighbors and a doctor was sent for. The woman had been dead for half an hour or more. As Collyer became more calm he said: "A few days ago my wife came to me and said, 'I have something terrible to tell you. I thought she was ill and tried to comfort her, but my kindness made her weep the more.' "That night she told me that she was unworthy of my love. I thought her mind was affected. Then she called in my brother Asa. Together they confessed the great wrong they had done me.



The mysterious death of Mrs. John Collyer, of Seaside, Rockaway Beach, is being investigated to-day by District Attorney Merrill, of Queens County. Her husband and his brother Asa have been arrested. There are conflicting stories as to the manner in which the woman met her death, and the police have not been able to determine whether it was a murder or a suicide. COMMANDER BULL FATALLY HURT.

Fell from Dome of Government Building at Buffalo.

BUFFALO, N. Y., June 8.—Commander J. H. Bull, of the United States Navy, in charge of the Hydrographic service on the Pan-American grounds, fell from the dome of the government building to-day and was probably fatally hurt. James H. Bull entered the navy in 1866. He is a native of this State. His last sea duty was on the Monterey in 1888. Since then he has been attached to the hydrographic survey.

TUG FOUNDERS; MAN DROWNED.

One Life Lost in the Sinking of the John A. Heath.

One man lost his life by the sinking of the tugboat John A. Heath in Butter-milk Channel to-day. The tug, which was out of commission, was being towed to the Atlantic Basin to have her boilers repaired. She suddenly capsized and sank. The towing tug and a Thirty-ninth street ferry-boat went to the rescue. After noses were counted one man, a fireman, was missing. He had gone down with the tug. HOYT LEFT \$160,000.

Referee Reports on the Estate of the Late Playwright.

Referee Edga J. Luchr, who was appointed by the Supreme Court to pass upon the accounts of the committee of the estate of the late Charles H. Hoyt, the playwright, shortly before his death, has filed his report in the Supreme Court. He finds that the estate was worth \$161,332, from which there is due to the committee \$5,000, together with other expenses. After deducting these sums he finds that the value of the property is now \$156,332, which will be transferred to Frank McKee and Thomas B. Clarke, who are the executors under Mr. Hoyt's will, which was recently admitted to probate.

FELON CAUSED INFECTION.

Mrs. McKinley's Physicians' Report Is More Hopeful.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Mrs. McKinley's physicians have issued the following bulletin: "Mrs. McKinley's illness has been a blood infection resulting from peritonitis of the index finger, bone felon, which began in Los Angeles and which was promptly treated by incision. The subsequent condition of exhaustion was due to the same blood infection associated with a severe diarrhoea. She improved, however, and was brought home in comfort and without loss of strength. The principal cause of anxiety in her case since her arrival in Washington has been an acute endocarditis, inflammation of the lining membrane of the heart, involving the mitral valve, the result of the same blood infection. "This does not appear to be progressive and there has been an improvement in the diarrhoea and in her general condition. Mrs. McKinley's case at the present time presents a more hopeful aspect."

CARNEGIE TO BE DOCTOR OF LAWS

GLASGOW, June 8.—Andrew Carnegie will be honored by the University of Glasgow next Thursday. On that date it will confer the degree of LL. D. on him in recognition of his gift to Scotch educational institutions. Other Scotch universities will take similar action.

The schedules in the assignment of Charles R. Sickels, the stock broker, of No. 15 Wall street, who assigned about four weeks ago to Philip Carpenter, of No. 38 Park Row, were filed to-day. They show that his liabilities are \$173,449, his nominal assets, \$64,000 and his actual assets, \$21,092.

Whitney and Belmont Buy Property Near Saratoga Course. SARATOGA, N. Y., June 8.—William C. Whitney, of New York City, President of the Saratoga Racing Association, has purchased of Isaiah Fuller, of Kingston, formerly warden of Clinton Prison, his extensive country place on Nelson avenue, in Saratoga Springs. August Belmont, of New York City, is negotiating for the purchase of the Gridley property, east of and in the rear of the Fuller property. Both are contiguous to the track of the Saratoga Racing Association.
