

MANAGER MANN SLOWLY DYING.

Bright's Disease Has Him in Its Grip and Hope Is Lost.

(Special to The Evening World.) SARATOGA, N. Y., July 11.—Manager Harry Mann, of the Knickerbocker Theatre, New York, was still alive at 9 o'clock to-day, but his death is manifestly expected. He has been in a state of coma for twelve hours. His relatives have been called in. Bright's disease is his ailment.

Mr. Mann's real name is Emanuel Haysman, and he is a brother of Al and Alf Haysman. They are now with him in Saratoga. When he went into the theatrical business a quarter of a century ago as manager of Barlow, Wilson, Primrose & West's Minstrels, he took the name of Harry Mann, and by that name he has since been known.

A little later Mann and August Pitou put Mr. William Scanlan forward as a star. This was a most successful venture, but Mr. Mann withdrew after a while to become the manager of Evans and Hoey, who were about to start out in their prosperous career with Mr. Charles Hoyt's "A Parlor Match." He managed this pair of comedians for five years with undiminished success, retiring from the position to undertake the management of the California Theatre, San Francisco, for his brother, Al Haysman.

He remained in San Francisco until 1896, when he came East to act as Charles Frohman's representative at the Standard, now the Manhattan Theatre, in this city. Later he went to Brooklyn to manage the Columbia Theatre, and afterwards to the Knickerbocker Theatre, in this city, when it passed into the possession of Mr. Haysman.

MARRIED IN TWO MINUTES.

of their honeymoon at the Bartholdi Hotel. With William F. White and Miss Elizabeth Ertsey they drove in two carriages to the City Hall yesterday looking for some one to marry them in a hurry. No Alderman being in sight, the couple drove to the home of Alderman James J. Smith, at No. 228 Madison street, and in two minutes were made man and wife. Wilhelm and White seemed greatly agitated and gave little information about the party.

LIEUT. BROWN IN MURDER TRIAL.

MANILA, July 11.—The trial of Lieut. Brown, of the Second Infantry, charged with murdering near Binangonan, Infanta Province, a native who was suspected of responsibility in the death of a soldier, began to-day. The soldier referred to was drowned while a detach-

ment of the Second Infantry was swimming a river under fire. The lieutenant, at the time of the occurrence, questioned the native and the latter bolted, whereupon Brown shot him dead. Capt. Francis P. Fremont, also of the Second Infantry, is being tried for striking a soldier. The court has requested that a witness now in Washington be ordered here to testify.

YOUNG WOMAN SOUGHT DEATH.

Mary Daly, twenty-two years old, attempted to jump from the upper deck of the Pennsylvania Railroad ferry-boat Philadelphia this forenoon as the boat was going from Twenty-third street to Jersey City. She was seen climbing over the rail

by Arthur Ackerman, a deckhand, who ran and grabbed her. She pleaded with him to let her go. "I want to die," she said. "For God's sake let me go. I want to end it all." The young woman was kept in the cabin until the boat reached Jersey City, when she was taken to a police station. She was held on a charge of disorderly conduct until her relatives could be notified.
