

TRUE TALES OF TROLLEY TERROR.

Inhumanity of B. R. T. Men to Injured Passengers, Convivance of Police and a Few Accidents.

The Brooklyn Rapid Transit employees tried to hush up an accident last night in which twenty persons were injured, and entailed great suffering upon the victims.

Althum conduct on the part of employees of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company may lead to the arrest of some of them on a criminal charge. In their anxiety to obey orders not to give information to newspapers they misled the police and ambulance surgeons and caused unnecessary suffering to many persons.

Though the accident occurred within two blocks of the Coney Island Emergency Hospital the injured, those who were found, were placed in a trolley car and hauled six miles to Coney Island before their wounds were dressed.

FOUR HURT IN TROLLEY SMASH.

A woman was so badly injured that she may die, three men were painfully bruised, a horse was killed and a carriage smashed in a trolley accident in Brooklyn early this morning.

Nothing about the accident was posted for the information of the reporters at Police Headquarters.

It was not until an Evening World reporter who had heard of the accident made a demand on the authorities that they would come out to say that they knew anything had happened.

The accident occurred at Nostrand avenue and Avenue F in Flatbush, Cor. 202 of the Nostrand avenue line, with a good crowd of passengers, was returning from Bergen beach and running at the rate of twenty-five miles an hour.

At Avenue F a carriage, containing Frank George of No. 131 Lefferts street, his wife and two friends, Angela Tuller, of Maple street, and Charles Murray, of Milwood street, drove on the track.

The car struck the rig. The horse was broken fifteen feet, and its neck was broken. Mrs. George was rolled along in front of the car some distance, and the carriage until the car was stopped. The men were hurled to the street.

Dr. Curwin, of No. 381 Avenue F, and Dr. Ogden of East Twenty-eighth street, were awakened. They attended to the injured and took them to their homes. The motorist, William Gorman, of No. 181-12 Marlon street, was not arrested, and it was only by accident that news of the occurrence got out.

Seven passengers who were badly injured were taken to a Vane right-angled trolley car and one motorist was laid to make a second call for help at Twenty-eighth street and Ninth avenue.

It was a frightful ride for the wounded. Several of them fainted on the trip. An ambulance from Stuyvesant Hospital was summoned by telephone and was waiting when the car reached the depot. First, we tried to determine whether the insect produced malaria, and if it did, could malaria be prevented by the extermination of the mosquito and its larvae."
