

DESERTED WIFE GOES INSANE.

SMALL WONDER WITH FIVE CHILDREN TO CARE FOR.

One boy of fifteen, left in the home, sees the furniture put into the street.

A small boy entered the office of Supt. Blair, of the Outdoor Poor Department, this afternoon and, with tears rolling down his cheeks, said that he was George Passuth, fifteen years old; that his mother, Mrs. Passuth, was in the insane pavilion for observation; that one brother was with his mother, and that three others had been placed in some institution.

The boy said that while he was alone in their home at No. 51 East Sixteenth street this morning the furniture in the place was carried into the street by orders of the landlord.

Supt. Blair at once started an investigation and learned that one child, John, one and a half years old, was a patient in the Children's Ward of Bellevue Hospital, and that three other children were in the Catholic Protectory.

The father and husband, Joseph Passuth, deserted his family some time ago, and since then the mother has been compelled to eke out a living as best she could for herself and five children.

A few days ago the woman showed signs of mental aberration and was taken to the insane pavilion. Her youngest child was ill and was taken from its mother.

Supt. Blair will make an effort to take care of the fifteen-year-old boy and store what little furniture the family has.
