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ARMY CUBS DEFEATED PENNSYLVANIA; SAILORS JUST BEATEN BY COLUMBIA.

ENTIRE NEW HAVEN ROAD IS LIKELY TO BE TIED UP.

Five Thousand Men Asked to Aid Striking Switchmen, Whose Demands Have Been Refused by the Company.

The officials of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad refused, after a conference to-day, to grant any of the demands of the striking freight handlers, and the strikers have voted to ask all the men in the freight department of the road between here and Boston to come out on a sympathetic strike.

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GEN. CORBIN ASKED BY LOW TO BE POLICE COMMISSIONER.

Adjt.-Gen. Corbin, according to a Washington despatch, says he has been invited by Mayor-elect Low to become Police Commissioner of New York. He refused this afternoon to say whether or not he would take it. It is not believed he will give up the Adjutant-Generalship of the Army.

District-Attorney Philbin, according to the Brooklyn Eagle, will be offered the place soon after Jan. 1.

LAUNDRESS AWARDED \$6,000 FOR LOST FOREARM.

Mary Ann Farrell, laundress at the Hotel Gerard, who sued William B. Gerard, the proprietor, for \$50,000 damages for the loss of her left forearm, crushed in a steam wringer, got an award of \$6,000 from a jury before Justice Truax late to-day.

Uncle Sam's Cadets Played Sensational Football in Last Game with Big Colleges Before the Army and Navy Clash.

FINAL SCORES: WEST POINT, 24; U. OF P., 0. COLUMBIA, 6; NAVY, 5.

WEST POINT, Nov. 20.—This afternoon the Cadets lined up on the parade grounds against University of Pennsylvania for the last game of the season on the home gridiron. The only remaining date on the schedule is the tussle with Annapolis on Franklin Field, Philadelphia, Nov. 30.

The Cadets were in splendid condition as they came rushing through the ally port. Seats had been provided on both sides of the field to accommodate the thousands of visitors and rooters. It was the general expectation that the game would be harder and closer than any played here this season.

WEST POINT won the toss and chose the north goal. Pennsylvania knocked back the 25-yard line, where Bunker fell upon the ball. Hall carried it back, and after ten minutes' play Cadet ran forty yards for a touch-down. Daly kicked the goal.

JURY TO TRY MRS. BONINE CHOSEN, AND CASE IS READY.

SENTRY FIRED ON FLEEING MAN.

A. R. De Clark, Military Prisoner, Shot While Trying to Escape from Fort Hamilton.

Abraham R. De Clark, twenty-one years old, a military prisoner at Fort Hamilton, tried to escape at 7:45 o'clock this morning. He got away from the prison, but was discovered by a sentry and pursued down Fifth avenue.

The sentry called repeatedly to the man to halt, but he only ran the faster, and the sentry finally fired at him. The shot struck De Clark in the back and he fell. He got up again but fell once more and the sentry caught up with him.
