LIFEBOAT CAPSIZES; 11 LOST; YACHT ENDYMION WRECKED.

Capt. Eldridge and Five Life Savers Perish While Trying to Rescue Five Men from the Stranded Barge Wodena, Near Chatham, Mass.

(Special to The Evening World.) CHATHAM, Mass., March 17.—In an attempt to rescue the crew of the stranded barge Wodena to-day the lifeboat of the Monomoy Life-Saving Station was capsized and eleven persons were drowned.

Surfman Ellis, of the life-saving crew, alone escaped. He was unconscious when brought ashore by Capt. Elmer Mayo, of the barge Fitzpatrick, who saved his life.

Syracuse Tommy Ryan and George Gardner, middleweight champion of New England, were matched this afternoon by Messrs. Lea and Gaven, the English sporting men, to meet in a twenty-round bout before the National Sporting Club, of London.

Charley White will referee this fight as well as two other big ones which are to be decided at the coronation. Messrs. Lea and Gaven, at the suggestion of Doc Orday, the American representative of the National Sporting Club of London, decided to engage Referee White to show English sportsmen how boxing contests are refereed in this country.

The English representatives also secured six of the best boxers of Yale to compete against the best men in Oxford and Cambridge Universities.

"PRINCESS" GOES TO INSANE WARD.

SAYS SHE WANTS HUSBAND AND PROPERTY.

Claims to Be the Wife of an Italian Nobleman of High Degree.

Arline G. Barlow, who styles herself "Genevieve, Princess de Farraro," was arraigned before Magistrate Mayo in the Yorkville Court this afternoon and committed to the Insane Pavilion of Bellevue Hospital to be examined as to her sanity.

The woman claims to be the wife of an Italian nobleman of high degree, who supposedly Spanish-American war with Squadron A, and who has since disappeared.

SAW RICE SIGN WILL, HE SAYS.

Morris Meyers Denies Story that Patrick Forged It.

ALIBI FOR THE DEFENDANT.

Strong Points Made To-Day in Effort to Break Down Valet Jones.

PATRICK'S DEFENSE AS IT NOW STANDS.

Albert T. Patrick's defense so far has consisted of efforts to break down the story of conspiracy and murder told by Valet Jones.

First—Testimony of medical experts to show that Millionaire Rice died from natural causes and was really dead at the time Jones says he chloroformed him.

Second—Marie Scott, Rice's servant, and Mrs. Isabelle Carpenter, of Dunellen, N. J., an old family friend, both declared they had seen Patrick at Rice's home and in conversation with the millionaire.

Third—Miss Alice Potts, Miss Mabel Elliott and Miss Elliott's mother testified that Patrick was at his boarding-house at the hour Jones asserted the defendant met him on the street and gave him the chloroform with which to commit the murder.

Fourth—Morris Meyers testified that he witnessed the signature of Rice to the will which Jones declared Patrick forged.

New and telling attacks were made to-day by Albert T. Patrick's lawyers, on the testimony of Valet Jones.

In the morning they established an alibi for Patrick covering the time Jones declared the defendant had given him a bottle of chloroform and urged him to put Millionaire Rice to death at once.

Three women testified in the establishment of the alibi, and one—a Bible student—fixed the time by having looked at her watch.

This afternoon the valet's story of the forgery of Rice's signature to the 1900 will was attacked. For this purpose Morris Meyers was first called. Meyers, as notary, and David L. Short, as Commissioner of Deeds, appeared as witnesses to the signature of Rice to the 1900 will and other disputed signatures.

Meyers said he saw Rice sign the will in the dining room at the millionaire's home.

Meyers is twenty-six years old, a

SHE PAINTED AS HE WASHED DISHES

ONE DAY SHE FOUND HIS REGISTERED COMPLAINTS.

Now Mrs. Lawton Asks Separation from Man Who Would Write Such Things.

Still protesting against washing dishes, minding babies and doing the rest of the housework, Frank H. Lawton put up a stiff fight before Justice Leventritt, in the Supreme Court, to-day, against his wife's efforts to secure a divorce.

Neither Frank nor Almira seems a rival in the other's heart except that each was wedded to art before the Vermont marriage in 1888. Frank's first love was music, Almira's was painting.

One day, she says, she found his diary, in which he had made notes unflattering to herself, wherefore she wants a separation, whatever she gets.

In his diary occur such passages as: "Every pair of pants gives it her foot." "Her" is anonymous, but evidently the next line explains it. It reads: "And they (her feet) are large enough to accommodate several hundred more."

"He played so much on his old musical instruments that he never had any time to do any kind of work," said this lady with much positiveness.

Ruby Griffith, an employee at the studio, testified that Mrs. Lawton worked very hard while she used to be around the place and would make or sell a frame now and then. He complained a great deal. He said his wife was not fit to be in charge of her children, that she ought to be in a lunatic asylum.

Almira, the painter artist, testified that in six months he earned \$137 for picture frames and \$27 for music lessons.

Frank's lawyer moved for a dismissal of the complaint on the ground that only ordinary family quarrels and not cruelty appeared in the evidence.

Frank H. Lawton, "musical artist" was called.

"I don't think so," the husband answered with a look of injured innocence. "I had to cook my own meals or go without."
