MASSASOIT WINS THE SECOND ROUND

Tecumseh Takes the First—Other Six Little Yachts Out-classed in Light Winds at Bridgeport.

BLACK ROCK, Conn., July 2.—All the eight little yachts which are competing in the Seawanhauk trial races left the Bridgeport Yacht Club float at 11 o'clock to-day and headed for the starting line.

The crews had apparently forgotten their differences of yesterday, when there were threats that some of the boats would be withdrawn altogether from the trial on account of the postponement of yesterday's series, and there was better feeling manifested to-day.

An hour before noon, the starting time, the wind was blowing seven knots an hour from the southwest, and conditions generally gave promise of a good racing day.

The committee laid the course two miles to leeward and return, the yachts to make three rounds of the course to finish the race.

The Tecumseh reached the finish line first, about two lengths ahead of the Massasoit, and won the first round of the race. The other yachts were bunched a considerable distance behind.

At no time during the race was the Tecumseh or Massasoit in apparent danger of being overtaken by the others.

The second race was started at 1:45, the Massasoit crossing the line first, with Philbuster closely following.

A few minutes after the start the Tecumseh forged ahead of the Philbuster. There was very little breeze blowing at this time and the water was smooth.

Massasoit finished first in the second race at 2:40, the Tecumseh coming in second about twenty-three seconds later.

The other boats were well behind and seemed to be having difficulty with the light wind, just as in the first race of the day.

The start was made promptly. Crusader crossed first, with the Massasoit following closely. Tecumseh and Seer were having a close contest for third place.

The boats were sent to windward in a breeze blowing about eight miles an hour. They raced two miles to windward and return, and then windward and leeward course was sailed three times.

The Tecumseh passed both Crusader and Massasoit on the run out and turned the outer mark at 12:41 well ahead.

The third race was started at 2:42, the Massasoit crossing the line first, with the Tecumseh immediately following. The wind continued very light.

How Proctor Knott Was Developed—Interesting Philosophy of Dead Turfman.

When John Morrow, who officiates in the capacity of associate judge in the stand at Fort Erie, heard of the death of Sam Bryant at his home in Kentucky last week he related some interesting history concerning the dead horseman. Judge Morrow probably knows as much turf history as any person living.

"More than fifty years ago Sam Bryant was a jockey, owner and trainer," said Judge Morrow. "When about as big as a blue-grass water jug—and water jugs in Kentucky in the '80s were quite small—young Sam began to ride in four-mile heat races. He weighed about 100 pounds then."
