LOST WEEKS IN FOREST.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 30.—G. S. Kemp, fifty years old, who disappeared from Monte Sano three months ago while on a tour of inspection of mining claims in Olympic Mountain, has been found here. He is alive, but a mere skeleton, having been lost in the forest many weeks.

ACCUSED MEN CAUGHT.

DENVER, Colo., July 30.—Charles Green, alias Charles Thomas, seventeen years of age, wanted at Buffalo as an alleged accomplice in the murder of Austin J. Crowe on June 2, was arrested here. John Doyle, wanted on the same charge, escaped. John Richards, another of the four men accused, was arrested when calling for mail at the post-office.

TOM JOHNSON BEATEN.

CLEVELAND, July 30.—Judge Phillips, of the Common Pleas Court, has rendered a decision against Mayor Johnson in the mandamus suit to compel County Auditor Craig to put the \$15,000 additional tax assessed by the City Board of Equalization against 80 big local corporations on the tax duplicate.

STONED HIM TO DEATH.

SANTA FE, N. M., July 30.—Luis Romero found Alejandro Seba paying attention to his wife, Romero summoned his relatives and they stoned Seba to death, then dragged his body over stones. The stoning was followed by a funeral in his home and there left it on the doorstep.

FREIGHT WRECK BLOCKS ROAD.

UTICA, N. Y., July 30.—A collision of freight trains occurred at Stittville, ten miles north of this city, to-day. A dozen freight cars were piled upon the track and Adirondack and Northern New York trains were delayed several hours.

TO CORNER TOMATOES.

BALTIMORE, July 30.—The American Packers' Association, known among canners of the eastern shore of Maryland as the "Tomato Trust," is having a \$1,000,000 mortgage recorded in all the States of the Maryland and Delaware peninsula in which the trust has been able to acquire canneries. The association expects to be able to control the market the coming fall and winter for its own benefit.

DETH IN CALIFORNIA OIL.

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., July 30.—A dead has just been commemorated whereof practically all of the oil-producing interests of Sammerland, located on the seashore, about four miles south of this city, have been consolidated and the product will hereafter be handled by a syndicate of Eastern capitalists, who have subscribed \$750,000 for development purposes.

KILLED BY TROLLEY.

PASSAIC, N. J., July 30.—Edward Carmen, forty years old, of Newark, was struck by a trolley car on the Passaic and Newark trolley line and so badly injured that he died in the Passaic General Hospital. It was necessary to take the trolley car off the line and to remove the injured man from under the wheels.

WIFE AND BROTHER LEFT TOGETHER.

John Sidell, of Jersey City, Has Warrants Issued for the Pair—Their Child is Gone, Too.

John Sidell, of Kelsey lane, near Grant Avenue, Jersey City, has sworn out a warrant for the arrest of his wife, Fannie Sidell, and his brother, Robert Sidell, who, he charges, have gone away together, taking with them his nine-year-old daughter.

THREE DROWNED FROM BOAT.



MACHINIST, AFTER YEARS OF LABOR, MAKES HIS OWN AUTOMOBILE ONLY TO BE ARRESTED.

Mueller's One Ambition Was to Make His Wife a Vehicle Like Vanderbilt's, but He Put on Too Much Speed.

Frank Mueller, a machinist, was in the West Side Court today broken in spirit, downcast, dejected, discouraged, crushed. And his troubles were brought about through his desire to see his pretty wife enjoy the same comfort and style the wife of a millionaire owner of an automobile experiences.

Willie K. Vanderbilt, Jr., and his automobile, "The White Ghost," happened to stop at the curb near where Mueller was standing, two years ago, and Mueller examined the machine thoroughly. He asked the millionaire about different points, and when he had learned what he could he went to his modest little home at No. 23 South Third street, Brooklyn, and said to his wife:

"We are to have an automobile ourselves and you are to enjoy the luxury of a rich man's wife. I know all about how to make it and I guess I can make a better one than 'The White Ghost'." So Mueller set aside a little room on the top floor, hardly big enough to turn around in, and there he started the construction of an automobile. With every spare cent he purchased castings, and in every spare moment he worked on the machine. His wife had little of his company and little of his earnings. All was going into the automobile.
