

FUNERAL OF BANKER FISH.

City's First Families Take Part in the Services in Old St. Mark's.

BURIAL AT GARRISONS

Coroner Jackson Postpones Inquest Until Monday, so that Testimony May Cover All Details of Tragedy.

From the historic church of St. Mark's, at Tenth street and Second avenue, where his illustrious ancestor, Peter Stuyvesant, is interred, and where for many years he had been a vestryman, Banker Nicholas Fish was buried this morning.

Representatives of New York's oldest families filled the church during the funeral services. The altar and chancel were banked with white roses and lilies of the valley, which showed dimly in the sanctuary light. The body of the church was not illuminated, and the congregation sat in the gloomy half-light that struggled through the stained-glass windows from the fog without.

The pastor of St. Mark's, the Rev. Dr. Batten, assisted by Drs. Dodd and Burlington, pronounced the simple burial ritual of the Episcopal church.

Mrs. Fish Bears Up Bravely.

Mrs. Fish was present and bore herself bravely. She entered on the arm of her brother-in-law, Hamilton Fish. Following her were Stuyvesant Fish and his daughter, Miss Marian Fish, Gen. and Mrs. Lloyd Bryce, Dr. and Mrs. Stuyvesant Fish Morris, Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton Fish Benjamin, Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton Fish Webster and Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Webster.

The family and relatives sat on the left side of the main aisle, the other side being occupied by members of the Society of the Cincinnati, the St. Nicholas Society, the New York Episcopal Society and the Delta Phi Chapter of Columbia University.

The honorary pall bearers were: George Peabody Wetmore, Charles A. Peabody, Frank S. Witherbee, W. Watts Sherman, George W. Folzom, Commander H. Rogers, Frank K. Pendleton, Dr. J. M. Woodbury, Talbot Oliphant, Louis L. Loring, George J. De Witt and Richard Martin.

Last Rite of Delta Phi.

At the conclusion of the service while the choir sang "Nearer My God to Thee," members of the Delta Phi arose from their pews and sang in single file past the coffin laid upon a bier made upon it in the form of a cross.

Across the altar, the coffin lay a floral blanket of white orchids and roses. At the head was a large design in dark blue and white, after the service the body was taken to the City Hall station, whence it was conveyed by special train to Garrison, on the Hudson, for interment beside that of Hamilton Fish at the first of Roosevelt's Riverside to lose his life in the Spanish-American war.

Coroner Jackson says he will likely postpone the Fish inquest from to-morrow until Monday, because the testimony may cover every detail of the tragedy. Mrs. Margaret Pickle, the third woman with Banker Fish in the hard's case, has been located by police in Boston, and it is thought she will be here to testify.

Both Men in Their Cups.

District Attorney Jerome said to-day that his assistant, Mr. Garvan, had made a very interesting report to him in investigation of Banker Fish's death. "From what I learn," he said, "it was simply a drunken brawl. Both men were in their cups. Mr. Fish made an ugly remark which angered Sharkey, and he struck the banker. There was no blackmail or conspiracy about it. Mr. Fish was a stranger to the people he picked up while intoxicated. If both men had been sober nothing would have happened."

The testimony of the women is not very material, as the police have a host of witnesses who saw Sharkey fall the banker with a blow. The inquest will not be held until Monday probably, and after it is concluded the matter will be placed before the Grand Jury.

Dr. O'Hanlon is making a microscopical examination of the brain of Banker Fish. The physician said to-day that from the examination already made, although it is far from being complete, it would be a difficult matter to say whether the blow which Mr. Fish received was actually the cause of death.

"There is evidence," said Dr. O'Hanlon, "that the brain in a diseased condition and that the lesions could possibly have broken down from the effects of the fall. I am not prepared to state at this time that the blow did not cause death."

MAYOR TALKS OF CITY'S SICK POOR

He Shows Where His Administration Has Vastly Improved Conditions in Almshouse.

HAVE FOOD ENOUGH NOW.

Under Tammany Rule Inmates Were Half Starved and Allowed No Butter at Supper and Breakfast.

Charities were discussed to-day by the Mayor in his seventh "weekly talk." He pointed out the great improvement in the care of the city's sick poor during a quarter of a century. The Mayor continued:

"The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in revising the budget last spring, agreed unanimously upon these propositions: That when it came to increasing the budget and issuing bonds, whatever else it did or did not do, it would do everything in its power, first, for the schools; second, for the sick; and third, for the city's poor. For the schools, because a year of schooling lost by a child is a loss that can never be made good; for the sick, because they suffer, and for the city's poor, because they are helpless and can do nothing for themselves."

"Acting under these considerations, the board authorized an issue of bonds for school buildings amounting to \$6,000,000. This is only \$1,200,000 less than was granted in the last two years put together. It largely increased the appropriations for the maintenance and care of hospitals, and made generous provision for their enlargement and the improvement of their plants. It increased by \$200,000 the appropriation for the supplies for the Department of Public Charities, so that the inmates of the almshouses and the hospitals in the care of this department might be properly fed and clothed."

Misused by Tammany.

"This increased appropriation for supplies in the Department of Public Charities, was made necessary because the previous administration had not supplied either enough of the most efficient variety of food nor a sufficient amount of clothing. During the entire year the inmates of the almshouse had no butter, either at breakfast or at supper. Their breakfast consisted of coffee, a little sugar and milk, and bread without butter. Not even upon Thanksgiving Day was there any special variation from this bill of fare for breakfast and supper."

Better Food Now.

"The inmates of the almshouse now eat. He has assured me again and again that the previous allowance, a half-ounce of butter and a half-ounce of syrup for each inmate, was an insufficient quantity of either. I have ordered oatmeal or rice on Saturday mornings, and one ounce of prunes on Sunday mornings. In the winter, I have ordered, once a week, and also the dried fruit. Among other changes in the diet, the patients in the Metropolitan Hospital have been given fresh cod fish, instead of the dried cod, as formerly. In the Hospital for Consumptives, opened on Jan. 1, 1902, specially generous diet was provided. The actual distribution of clothing and bedding during the first eight months of 1901 amounted to \$25,000, although one-eighth of the patients transferred in 1901 had been transferred in 1902 to the care of the patients of Bellevue and allied hospitals."

"Commissioner Folks summarizes the present and future needs of the department as follows: First—Extensive changes in existing buildings to introduce modern plumbing and heating and ventilating systems. Second—The construction at the various hospitals and almshouses of separate buildings for the accommodation of employees. Third—Additional almshouse accommodations both on Blackwell's Island and at Flatbush. Fourth—An electric lighting plant on Blackwell's Island. Fifth—More hospital accommodations for consumptives. Sixth—Hospital for convalescents."
