A mild and beneficent glow of domestic sentiment radiated from the stage of the Bijou Theatre last night when Mr. J. E. Dodson and Miss Annie Irish made their first appearance in New York as married co-stars.

It was touching. One pictured the long years of waiting, of travelling on separate routes, of lonely breakfasts, of unsewed buttons and undarned socks and the thousand discomforts of matrimonial apartments.

At least, that was the way I pictured it until I remembered having seen Mr. Dodson and Miss Irish playing subordinate parts in the same company last season, and then I wasn't so sure about the separation feature of it.

But it's just as well to have that sort of thing to distract you when you see "An American Invasion," for it is a weak and foolish concoction, in which the characters overhear one another's "sides," and wander on and off the stage without any reasonable motive, but merely at the author's sweet will.

Mr. Dodson plays the American, and he is very American, indeed. The part does not begin to give him an opening for his talents, but such as it is he makes more out of it than might have been expected.

Miss Annie Irish is best known to New York in her gentle widow parts, in which her modest gifts and bland personality suit her.
