

M'LAUGHLIN IN HILL'S DEFENSE.

Veteran Democratic "Boss" of Brooklyn Says Former Senator is "the Only Man for State Leader in New York."

DID NOT DEFEAT MR. COLER.

Credit for Brooklynite's Nomination, He Says, Belongs to Mr. Hill, and He Characterizes His Detractors as a "Lot of Snarling Puppies."

Hugh McLaughlin, the aged leader of the Brooklyn Democracy, resenting the post-election attacks upon David B. Hill, and in a vigorous interview to-day defends the former Senator against the charge that he was responsible for the loss of the recent State fight.

Mr. McLaughlin said: "All the credit for Mr. Coler's nomination belongs to Hill and all the blame, if there be any blame, belongs to me. Why this outcry against Hill now? I shall tell you why. It is because he listened to the demand of the rank and file of the Democracy of the State and gave the young and vigorous candidate. Now a pack of snarling puppies snap at his heels. He does not, fortunately, need to mind them.

"Mr. Hill's critics say that he should be cast aside, but they suggest no man to take his place. Mr. Hill is without a peer in his State as a leader. He is a born leader. Samuel J. Tilden picked him out and made him leader, and Samuel J. Tilden knew men. Since that time Mr. Hill has mounted step by step, has been twice Governor and has been United States Senator. He has made nothing out of politics. His enemies have not been able to find a piece of cheese or a bottle of patent medicine in his possession, that had a political connection.

Only Man for Leader.

"I have watched Mr. Hill carefully all through his career, and I am satisfied that he is the only man now in the State who can fill the position of State leader.

"A few years ago I contributed by non-action to the defeat of Mr. Hill as State leader. I let some other fellows have their way and did not stretch out my hand. But I knew then, and I told those other fellows, 'You are making a great mistake.

"It is absurd this talk about Hill sidetracking Judge Parker to serve his own personal ends. Judge Parker was never a candidate, and would not have taken the nomination any more than I would pick up that stove, which is glowing hot. As to personal preference, do not these carpers know that it was Hill who made the nomination of Judge Parker, who brought it about and who arranged it so that he could be elected?"

Reply to an Editorial.

This interview was specifically in reply to an editorial in the Albany Argus entitled, 'Overboard with the Jonah,' and demanding the removal of Hill as State leader.

In Brooklyn, however, there is a feeling that the rank and file of the party is not in accord with the sentiments of Mr. McLaughlin, while it is well known that the leaders of Tammany are almost unanimous in their demand for a change.

Ex-Senator Hill's only comment thus far is: "I really have nothing to say."

J. W. MACKAY'S BODY ARRIVES. ROOSEVELT OFF FOR THE WOODS

Widow of Millionaire and His Daughter, the Princess Colonna, Passengers on Oceanic, Which Brings the Casket.

RESTS IN MORTUARY CHAPEL. PANTHERS IN PLENTY, TOO.

The body of the late John W. Mackay, who died of pneumonia in London July 20, was brought back to this country to-day. It arrived on the Oceanic.

Mrs. Mackay, the millionaire's widow, and his daughter, the Princess Colonna, also arrived. They were met at quarantine by Clarence Mackay, the only surviving son of Mr. Mackay, who went down the bay in a revenue cutter.

At the White Star pier were Vice-President D. T. Ward, of the Commercial Cable Company, of which corporation Mr. Mackay was President, and a number of other business friends of the great cable builder. Mrs. Mackay and her daughter were immediately driven away.

Clarence remained to look after the body. It was taken from the steamer by Undertaker Edward Bayha, of No. 22 Atlantic avenue, Brooklyn, and sent at once to Greenwood Cemetery, where the interment took place this afternoon.

Father Ducey, of St. Leo's, conducted the ceremony. The funeral was private, being attended only by the members of the immediate family.

BLAME NOBODY FOR EXPLOSION.

Coroner's Jury Says Cause of Fireworks Explosion Is Unknown and Prisoners Freed.

The Coroner's jury which has been investigating the cause of the fireworks explosion which caused fourteen deaths in Madison Square on election night, concluded their work to-day.

Their verdict was that the cause of the accident was unknown and Coroner Scholer immediately discharged from custody John Craig and John Lamantia.

The jury suggested that hereafter the explosion of bombs be prohibited at all times in the streets and parks of the city.

When the inquest was resumed before Coroner Scholer to-day John Mamanantia, who lighted the fatal bomb, testified that he could not say who told him to light the fuse.

"It was placed in the mortar," he answered, "by Charles in Homer, and somebody told me I took a torch and touched it to the fuse. I did not know the danger. The explosion rendered me unconscious, and when I revived I heard that a lot of people had been killed. That is about all I know."

Henry P. Pain was then called. The mortar, he said, had been used repeatedly. He got them from his father. They had been manufactured by the Armstrongs of England. He said he allowed people to stand as near as without thought of it.

"Do you think so now?" asked Mr. Schurman.

"I don't see why not. We don't know what caused the explosion. I could fire a thousand shells from that same mortar, giving it time to cool between shots, and there would be no such accident."

Coroner Scholer then told the jury that in his mind there was no doubt somebody was criminally responsible for the explosion.
