

MAY NOT DISPEL CLOUD OF SMOKE

Board of Health Undecided About Enforcing Use of Hard Coal, as Ordered by Mayor After Nov. 15.

MIGHT MAKE PRICES HIGHER.

Dr. Lederle Causing an Independent Investigation to Be Made to Ascertain Exact Amount of Anthracite Which Reaches City.

The Board of Health is as yet undecided as to whether it will be advisable to enforce the smoke nuisance ordinance after Nov. 15, as Mayor Low has warned consumers of soft coal will be done.

President Ernest G. Lederle said today he expected to have another talk with the Mayor on the subject before taking definite steps. In the mean time he is having an independent investigation made by officers of the Health Department with a view to ascertaining the amount of coal which is daily arriving here and what becomes of it.

Will Talk with Mayor. "As a rule," said President Lederle, "I do not believe in suspending ordinances, but circumstances sometimes make it necessary. As soon as I finish the investigation which I am now carrying on, I shall talk with Mayor Low and he will decide whether he wants the suspension to continue or whether the ordinance is to be enforced.

The question simply comes down to this: Forcing the factories, department stores and hotels to stop using soft coal and take up hard coal will create such a scarcity as to cause householders to pay higher prices and perhaps have difficulty in getting coal at all. It's just a matter of arithmetic. Increase in the production of steam sizes at the mines to supply those who are now using soft coal will probably curtail the production of domestic sizes. But I can tell more about the situation when I get my reports."

Dr. Lederle would not say what methods he was employing to get at the coal situation, but it was said that Health Department inspectors were visiting the railroad yards with a view to learning just how many cars of coal are arriving daily.

Where Soft Coal is Used. According to statistics of the Building Department, there are in Manhattan and the Bronx 2,726 office buildings, and 1,197 hotels. With the exception of the hotels—the great majority of which are hotels in name only and use domestic-sized coal—the rest of these establishments have been using soft coal very largely. If they turn back to hard coal, there will be a great demand, but even if the enforcement of the ordinance were put off two years the soft coal users would be able to furnish good arguments against it.

A coal statistician has figured out that the whole country uses about 100,000,000 tons of hard coal for this year's annual consumption, and that therefore the shortage is bound to keep up all winter, but only here, but in all parts of the United States. FOXHALL KEENE FIGHTS ARREST.

Millionaire Horseman and Wife, Speeding Automobile, Over-taken by Deputy Sheriff on Bicycle—Pleads "Not Guilty."

SAYS HE HEARD NO SIGNAL.

If He Was Going at Rate of Twenty Miles an Hour, as Charged, He Argues, Captor Could Not Have Overhauled Him on Wheel.

Foxhall Keene was arrested on the road near Norwich, L. I., by a deputy sheriff, charged with driving his automobile at a speed exceeding the limit set by law. He went immediately before Justice of the Peace Franklin and said that he would fight the case. The hearing was set for next Tuesday.

The machine was being driven by Mr. Keene although a chauffeur was in the auto. Mrs. Keene was beside her husband. Deputy Sheriff John Garvin says he signalled the party to stop, but that his order was ignored. He told the magistrate that the machine was traveling at the rate of about twenty miles an hour.

When Mr. Keene did not stop, the deputy sheriff mounted his wheel and overtook him. That he was able to stop will be one of the strongest points urged by the defense. When Garvin rode alongside the machine Mr. Keene stopped.

Deputy Sheriff Meehan offered to allow him to go on to the Meadow Brook Hunt if he would promise to appear, but the millionaire refused. He took the deputy sheriffs in the auto and went before the magistrate.

When the trial is called Mr. Keene will call experts to show that the machine cannot attain the speed credited to it with the present gear, which he said he had put on in order to guard against an infraction of the law. He says he did not see Garvin signal him to stop, and that he did not decrease his speed from the point where the deputy sheriff stood to the spot where he was overtaken.

If he was driving the machine twenty miles an hour he thinks Garvin must be a phenomenal cyclist. The distance will be measured and Mr. Keene will attempt to show that the deputy rode his wheel at an impossible speed if the auto was going as fast as charged.

CRUEL DRIVER BIT HORSE ON THE LIP. Justice Shocked by the Story of Brutality Told in Court by a Policeman.

George Lohr, of No. 185 Stockholm street, Brooklyn, was arraigned in the Court of Special Sessions today, charged with biting his horse in the lip.

The charge against Lohr was preferred by Policeman Wiley, of the Union Market station. He informed the justice that on Aug. 4 last he came across the prisoner at Avenue D and Third street.

The man, he said, was cruelly beating his horse with the reins and traces of the harness. Before he could remonstrate with the man, however, he was staggered by seeing him jump out of his wagon, rush to the horse's head and liberally bite the animal in the lip, inflicting a painful wound, from which the blood flowed freely.

Lohr vigorously denied the biting and asserted that the horse had cut his lip on a nail in his manger. His denial had no weight with the court, however, for the presiding justice, after scoring him in unmeasured terms for his cruelty, fined him \$5, which he reluctantly paid.

CLOSE SHAVE FOR TROLLEY. Dodged Express Train, but Rear Fender Was Carried Away.

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Nov. 12.—A trolley car had a narrow escape from being run down by an express train on George street today, and so close a shave was it that the rear fender of the car was knocked off by the locomotive of the train. The car had been stopped by a team of balky horses when it was half way across the track, the animals refusing to move.


