

MRS. EDDY CAN'T SISTER OF MRS. MAKE MISTAKES. HANNA TO WED.

So Her Disciple, Mrs. Laura Lathrop, Says, and Declares Recent Edict Does Not Recognize Contagious Diseases.

ALL WILL OBEY THE ORDER. WERE FINALLY WON OVER.

Move Proceeded from Her Love of Humanity, This Follower Says, and Will Aid the Cause of Christian Science.

"Mary Baker Eddy has not recognized the reality of contagious diseases," announced Mrs. Laura Lathrop this morning. "Mrs. Eddy's edict forbidding Christian Scientist practitioners to treat contagious diseases in any way weakens the power of our creed."

With the optimism characteristic of the Christian Scientist, Mrs. Lathrop stated this morning that she was not even surprised at the "Church Mothers' action, though from an occasional remark it was evident that the head of the New York Christian Scientists regarded the action of the great leader with something akin to that emotion. "What are the Christian Scientists going to do now that Mrs. Eddy has apparently recognized the reality of contagious disease?" Mrs. Lathrop smiled.

"I have been a student of Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy for more than eighteen years, and I know that from the standpoint of Christian Science it would be utterly impossible for her to recognize the reality of any disease. We will, of course, obey her implicitly. As I read her suggestion in last week's Christian Science Sentinel, I know it to be simply a 'suffer it to be so, mood,' as she herself intimates.

"Christian Science is founded upon a great principle and it cannot depart from it. I am sure that this advice from the founder of Christian Science to her students proceeds from the great love she bears humanity and her desire to relieve the community from any fear they may have that we will spread contagion.

"I never question Mrs. Eddy nor do I ever meditate upon her dures. She is higher spiritually than I. Mrs. Eddy is incapable of making a mistake, and this step in regard to contagious diseases comes only from her appreciation of the ignorance of the principle of Christian Science.

"The public mind is steeped in ignorance, and Mrs. Eddy, with her loving forethought, has forbidden Christian Scientist practitioners treating contagious diseases simply because she sees in her great wisdom that the public are not yet ready to accept our creed.

"As for the practitioners, it will not affect their practice. Most of our cases are chronic ones.

"Contagious diseases are nearly always placed in the hands of physicians. We will not suffer from loss of practice. It will, in fact, come as a relief. As for me, I have more patients now than I can conveniently care for."

"I am always cautious about discussing these affairs for publication. The public seem to regard it as a case of divine syrup, and do not recognize the great principles of our faith.

"Mrs. Eddy's decree is, of course, for the best. If a contagious case would be reported to me, I never question why I should not treat it. I never question why I should follow. I am a thinking woman, but where Mrs. Eddy's decree is concerned I never think.

"The woman who wrote 'Science and Health' cannot err.

"As to her decree in regard to contagious diseases, it is only a temporary injunction adapted to the present state of ignorance of the public mind. It will not injure our precedence—it will assist us.

"Mrs. Lathrop spoke enthusiastically of Judge Ewing's address at White Plains, last night.

"The interest in that meeting shows with what regard our faith is looked upon," she said.

TO SAVE MERCHANTS' LOSS.

Brooklyn's Subway Likely to Be Built with That Idea.

There was a meeting of Brooklyn merchants doing business in Fulton street between the Borough Hall and Flatbush avenue in President Swannstrom's office to-day to urge the Rapid Transit Commission to take steps to keep the loss and inconvenience down to a minimum during the construction of the new subway along that part of the route.

Resolutions were passed asking that body to instruct the contractors to work day and night to have at least three sections, each of which should be finished before any other was opened, and in view of the peculiar relation of that strip of street to all the inhabitants of Brooklyn as well as to the merchants doing business along it, to take any steps which seemed wise to the Commissioners to make the loss and inconvenience as little as possible.

GIBRALTAR, Nov. 14.—Foreigners in Tetuan, Morocco, are in such peril that three British warships have gone from here to that point—the cruisers Puelous, Paeletus and Prometheus.

WEALTHY MRS. WOERZ, IT IS SAID, SAILED SECRETLY FOR EUROPE TO ESCAPE SERVICE IN HER HUSBAND'S SUIT.

HER MOTHER DENIES IT.

Brewer's Wife Wept on the Pier and from What She Said Before Boarding Steamer It Is Believed She Still Loves Husband.

If the divorce action brought by Fred W. Woerz, the rich brewer, against his wife comes up in the near future Mrs. Woerz will not be here to defend it. It has been learned that she was the woman who sailed Oct. 29, after attracting a great deal of attention at the dock by reason of her peculiar actions.

She appeared there with an older woman. Both of them were heavily veiled. The younger woman wept a great deal and seemed to be in fear that some one might arrive at the pier and do her harm. She got off safely.

Mrs. George P. Lela, mother of Mrs. Woerz, who lives at No. 106 East Seventy-eighth street, refused to confirm or deny to-day the report that her daughter had sailed for Europe. All the shopkeepers in the neighborhood of the Woerz home, No. 26 East Eighth street, understand that she did sail on the Majestic.

On Oct. 27, Mrs. Woerz's maid went to the drug store at Seventy-eighth street and Park avenue and bought a lot of camphor for packing purposes. She said her mistress was going to Europe on the following Saturday. At the Staten Island eye shop on Madison avenue, just below Eighth street, it was also said that Mrs. Woerz had a lot of clothing cleaned before sailing.

The Woerz house has been closed and there is now a "For Sale" sign prominently displayed on it. Mrs. Woerz is said to be stopping at the Hotel Netherlands but she denies herself to interviewers.

Whether the suit is defended or not by Mrs. Woerz it is said that the famous violinist who has been named as one of the co-respondents will make a tour of the city. A peculiar feature of this development which probably accounts for the violinist engaging counsel, is the fact that a romantic story of his engagement to a young Russian girl came over the wires from Paris within a few days after his own departure.

From what she said before sailing it appears that Mrs. Woerz still loves her husband devotedly and that her trip abroad was made under duress. The principal witnesses in the divorce proceedings will be Katherine Ward, Mrs. Woerz's former maid, who lives in East Eighth-third street. Like all the other parties to the suit, she maintains strict silence.

EARLY MORNING BLAZE.

But Tenants Had Faith in Fire-proof Qualities of Building.
