

## TAMMANY'S 19 CAPTAINS O. K.

Police Sergeants Who Were Promoted by York and Sexton Will Hold Their Places by Court's Ruling.

### SURPRISE TO PARTRIDGE.

In a decision handed down by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court in Brooklyn to-day the action of the Civil-Service Reform Association in contesting the appointment of the nineteen police captains by the York-Sexton Police Board was dismissed.

The decision was a great surprise, as it had been predicted on all sides that the Appellate Division would throw the captains out.

In December, 1900, and February, 1901, the York board appointed nineteen captains. Suit was brought by the Civil-Service Reform Association, using the name of J. Warren Green, a taxpayer, against Charles H. Knox, former President of the Civil-Service Board, which had sanctioned the appointment of the captains by approving the pay-rolls.

The police captains filed a demurrer to this suit in which they held that it was not a proper action for a taxpayer's suit, that the payment of the salaries was not a waste of public money.

Justice Herrick dismissed the demurrer and the captains to the action to the Appellate Division. The decision given to-day sustains the demurrer, thus dismissing the suit in the name of the taxpayer.

The nineteen captains who will continue to hold office under this decision are Edward J. Kenney, Jefferson Devoe, John Mara, Michael Gorman, Edward Walsh, Edward J. Toole, James Gannon, John E. Colgan, Lawrence J. Murphy, John Buchanan, John Cooney, John S. Flood, Michael E. Foody, Francis J. Kear, Edward J. Gaus, John J. Lantry, Charles C. Wendel, Francis A. Creamer and Michael Devaney.

## STOLEN SILK IS HIDDEN NEARBY.

Police Believe Thieves Who Took \$20,000 Worth of Goods from Big Store Could Not Have Gone Far.

### LITTLE GIRL SAW FOUR MEN.

A house to house canvass is being made this afternoon by Central Office detectives in the hope of locating the \$20,000 worth of goods stolen last night from the department store of Steinhardt & Straubinger, No. 283 Grand street.

The detectives think the goods have been hidden in the immediate neighborhood of the store because such a quantity was taken that it would have been most difficult for the thieves to have escaped with the stuff unnoticed. And yet such was the shrewdness shown by the men in the hour chosen for their work that it is by no means impossible that they carried the stuff away in trucks without raising suspicion.

The police have found a little girl who says she saw four men on the roof of the store about 7 o'clock last night, and from this it is believed that this was the hour when the thieves did their work. Entrance was gained through the roof. The scuttles were forced and then by means of a ladder the robbers got down to the main floors easily. They showed great familiarity with the location of the goods in the store.

They chose the most valuable things, the greater part of their booty consisting of 600 rolls of silk, valued at \$20 a roll. They also stole a lot of silk shawls and blankets.

Mr. Straubinger said that it would have taken at least fifteen men an hour to get all the stolen stuff out of the store. He thinks that they had trucks loaded in the adjoining street which they then across several roofs to one of the buildings which he permitted them to reach without being noticed.

While it is dark at that hour, there are still many trucks in the street and little attention might be paid to them by passers by. Notwithstanding this, the police think the "plant" is in the immediate neighborhood, and they are now working on that theory.

There is no watchman in the store. The rooms which were looted were in the rear so that the thieves could have worked with lights and not been seen from the street.

## CAMPBELL WILL FILED IN COURT

Document Found Among Ex-Congressman's Papers Creates Special Trust Funds of \$100,000.

### ANNUITIES FOR RELATIVES.

The will of the late Felix Campbell, formerly Congressman from Brooklyn, was filed for probate with the Surrogate this afternoon. The rumor that there had been difficulty in finding the will had no foundation in fact. It was signed on June 14, 1885.

To his sister, Mary Lynch, and his brothers, John and Patrick, Mr. Campbell left an annuity of \$1,000 each. To his wife's sister, Annie, his niece, Etta and Mary Campbell, his nephew, George Campbell, and his cousin, the Rev. John J. Ward, of Philadelphia, he left annuities of \$500 each.

A trust fund of \$100,000 for the benefit of the wife during her life is established. At her death it is to be divided equally among the surviving children. Similar trust funds are established for the benefit of two daughters, Minnie and Sadie.

The sum of \$1,000 is left to the Roman Catholic Orphan Asylum, the Protestant Orphan Asylum and the Protestant Home for the Blind, or his successor in office, to be bequeathed \$10,000 to be applied to the erection and completion of the Roman Catholic cathedral in Brooklyn.

The balance of the estate, the value of which is not given, is to be divided between the widow and daughters. The widow, Patrick Campbell, a brother, and Alice Campbell, a daughter, are named as executors of the will and joint trustees with the People's Trust Company, of the various trust funds.
