
One summer, when Mabelle was in her fourteenth year, an old lady and her married daughter came to board for a few weeks at the little fishing village.

WILL MARGONI WIPE OUT 200,000 MILES OF GABLE? SOON THE EARTH WILL BE GIRDLED TWICE WITH ROPES OF COPPER.

The All-British, Round-the-World Cable Just Completed—The Mackay Pacific Cable Just Begun—About \$250,000,000, if Not More, Now Invested in the Submarine Telegraph Lines.



FROM Glace Bay, Nova Scotia, to Polkhu, Cornwall, a distance of over two thousand miles, Marconi, inventor of the wireless telegraph, flashed a greeting to King Edward last week.

Starting at The World office, a message may now be sent around the earth by way of Canada to Vancouver, thence to Norfolk Islands, north of New Zealand; thence to Sydney, in Australia, and via the Great Eastern Telegraph lines to London and New York.

Marconi's wireless message to King Edward calls our attention to the great network of cables circling and covering the planet. They may be replaced by the Italian's simpler device, or they may not.

will be seen that the actual cost of cable construction was over \$1,000 a mile. Forty years is the extreme limit of a submarine cable's usefulness.

It is certainly remarkable that the moment which witnesses Marconi's triumph should also witness the completion of the long-dreamed-of British cable, which completely circles the earth.

Several of the world's cable systems were from peculiar difficulties of construction, laid at a cost of much more than \$1,000 a mile, but if this sum be taken as the average cost of laying it will be seen that if the wireless telegram becomes a business actually nearly 175,000 miles of cable, or \$175,000,000 worth, will be rendered useless.
