

LAW MEETS TWO TYPES OF WOMEN

One Defiant, the Other Meek, and Both Sent to Prison for Grave Offenses by Recorder Goff.

GIRL FALLS IN FAINT.

Begging for Mercy She Sinks to the Floor When Told that She Could Be Sentenced for Twenty Years— Revived by Court Officers.

Before Recorder Goff in General Sessions to-day were arraigned two women, one brazen and defiant, the other meek and humble. Both were directly opposite—one a woman of the world, the other poor, homeless and friendless.

The first was Kate Telford-Hickey, convicted of perjury. For years this woman, a graduate of a convent and speaking several languages, has lived by her wits only, escaping jail to plunge into another escapade. She defrauded, so it is alleged, whoever she entangled in her toils. A month ago she was tried and convicted before the Recorder of having sworn falsely in a suit she brought against Mrs. Jennie E. Kuttin-

gen, of No. 120 West Twenty-first street, by whom she swore she had been engaged as secretary. "I have no pity for you," the Recorder told the woman, "for you should have known better. I will send you to the State prison at Auburn for not less than eighteen months nor more than three years."

PLANS ROUND-UP OF BIGAMISTS.

District-Attorney Examines Evidence Presented in Uncontested Divorce Cases, with a View to Criminal Prosecution.

JUSTICE TRUAX WRATHFUL.

There is to be a round-up of alleged bigamists in the Court of General Sessions. One of the most common causes assigned for divorce in the weekly "bargain day," when uncontested divorce cases are tried, is that husband or wife had disappeared and married another. Alternating with these are suits for annulment because the suing husband or wife has discovered that the life partner had a wife or husband by a previous marriage.

This involves a charge of bigamy in either case, and it has been a matter of curiosity why these alleged bigamists are never prosecuted.

Justice Truax had three such cases on his calendar Feb. 24, and in each the defendant not only did not defend, but actually came forward as a witness and confessed the bigamy charges.

This aroused the wrath of Justice Truax and he sent for District-Attorney Jerome. Assistant District-Attorney Gray consulted with the Justice and examined the evidence in a dozen such cases to-day, and as a result warrants are out for several men and women.

Among the cases especially referred to by Justice Truax was that of Mrs. Marie Mulert, who on being sued by Charles R. Mulert for an annulment of their marriage at No. 234 West Twenty-first street, July 21 last, appeared as a witness to help his suit. She testified that she was married to Albert Stoetzer in 1877, but that he went to the Pan-American Exposition, Buffalo, and did not return. Believing she had a right to consider him dead, she married Mulert.

Another under investigation is that of Dr. Paul S. Stolbren, professor of languages in the De Witt Clinton High School. When the Stolbrens sued James F. Walsh, public prosecutor of Greenwich, Conn., for possession of his own will, let in Walsh's custody, it developed that while he named Lena Volmering as his common-law wife in the will, two other women claimed to be his wife. One, Mrs. Mary Kennedy-Stolbren, of New York, and the other, in the Bronx, has sued him for absolute divorce.

ERIE ENGINEERS WANT MORE PAY FROM ROOSEVELT

A Committee Is in New York Holding a Conference with the Railroad Officials on Proposed New Schedule.

HE WAS CELEBRATING.

A committee representing the engineers of the Erie Railway system is in this city conferring with officials. They have asked for an increase in pay and presented in detail their plan for a readjustment of wages. The committee has had two conferences with the officials, but no agreement has been reached.

An officer of the road said that the company recognized the fact that for certain reasons some of the employees of the road should receive increased pay, but in the case of engineers the number of men involved was so great and the conditions on the division so varied that reaching a settlement with the engineers was a slow process.

"But there is no reason to believe," an official said, "that the result of the conference will not be entirely satisfactory. The road is willing to give its employees what is generally paid for similar kinds of work. The negotiations with the engineers, who are here as employees, but are not generally paid for similar kinds of work, were begun amicably and no doubt will continue so."

The negotiations with the engineers had not received any increase in pay in fifteen years. Their pay now is on a basis of \$60 a day for twelve hours, but a division run is counted as a day, and some passenger engineers make it in five or six hours.

COULDN'T POSSIBLY BE A JURYMAN.

In Fact Werna J. Amarth Is of the Wrong Sex and So Is Excused from Serving.

Among the hundreds of men who appeared at the office of Commissioner of Jurors Brenner, in Brooklyn, to-day in response to subpoenas for jury service was one lone woman, who was immediately embarrassed by the predicament in which she found herself.

She had a subpoena, just like the men. Commissioner Brenner spied her gayer garments in the sombre black mass of the male contingent and called her forth to inquire the reason for her presence.

She presented the subpoena, which was made out for Werna J. Amarth. "Is that your name?" inquired the Commissioner. "It is," replied the woman, and then she went on to explain that she is the private secretary of County Clerk Hartshorn and lives at No. 948 Greene avenue.

The directory is used in making up the jury list her name was taken to be that of a man, and so she was summoned. Commissioner Brenner apologized for the error and assured Miss Amarth that the mistake would never occur again while he was in office. He thereupon marked Werna J. Amarth as ineligible for service, and the young woman was excused.


